WORLD IS OREGON'S PRUNE MARKET

Report of Oregon Growers Shipments Show That Many Countries Are Buyers.

SOME PRUNES HELD

Over Three Million Pounds of Oregon Prunes Remain in Warehouses—Larger Than the California Fruit.

Of the 28,828 acres of fruit controlled by the Oregon Growers Cooperative association, 14,014 acres are prunes. Other acreage is as follows: Apples, 6779; pears, 5623; cherries, 897; walnuts, 1119; berries, 885; miscellaneous, 121.

Of the three great fruit valleys in western Oregon, the acreage of the association is divided as follows: Willamette valley, 17,536; Rogue River valley, 6727; Umpqua valley, 4575.

During the past season about 12,000,000 pounds of prunes were shipped to the association by its members. Of this total, there remained on hand April 26 at the various plants, 3,977,043 pounds.

England has been a heavy buyer of Oregon prunes. During this past season 419,050 pounds were shipped to Liverpool, 411,250 pounds to London, 55,000 pounds to Glasgow, and 21,250 pounds to Bristol.

The Canadian market was supplied through Montreal, which bought 113,750 pounds. Holland was supplied through Rotterdam, with purchases of 175,175 pounds. A portion of the shipment to Rotterdam was made through the Panama canal.

In the United States, New York City is of course the great prune market, as it bought 1,750,915 pounds. With shipments to other New York cities, the total to the state of New York amounted to 1,940,015 pounds.

Large Increases in Minerals

 NEW WESTMINSTER, B. C., May 2.—The value of minerals produced in British Columbia during the past year totalled \$29,580,312. This represents an increase of 100 per cent over \$2,284,312 over the 1919 total according to the figures made public today by the department of mines. The largest increases were registered in silver, copper and zinc.

BOSTON, April 30.—Dress reformers of the present day, who deplore the abbreviated skirt and the peek-a-boo waist, may be astounded to learn that even the good old Puritan times, the laro of Dame Fashion had a bewitching effect on the young men and maidens. Researches into the ancient laws of the Massachusetts Bay Colonies, have revealed that the fathers had their own many troubles with their offspring who recognized a snappy style when they saw it.

In 1634, just four years after the arrival of Winthrop's ships, the apparel question had become so pressing that the law makers tried their hands as fashion moulders. Here is the statute placed on the books in the original wording:

The Court taking into consideration the great superfluous and unnecessary expense occasioned by reason of some new and immodest fashions as also the ordinary wearing of silver, gold, and silk laces, girdles, hat bands, etc., hath therefore ordered that no person, either man or woman, shall hereafter make or buy apparel, either woollen, silk or of lynes, with any lace on it, silver, gold, gold silk or thread, under the penalty of forfeiture of such clothes.

"Provided"—and it is the meaning of this court that men and women shall have the liberty to wear such apparel as they are now provided of, except the immodest girdle, sleeves, slashed apparel, immoderate girdle, loose wings, etc.

"This order is to take place a fortnight after the publishing thereof."

This treatment is for those with oily hair only, and the once a week treatment is too often for those not bothered in that way. The frequent washing will not injure your hair in any way, but will improve it very much. It is very easy to arrange fluffy, clean hair, and you ought not to have any trouble.
