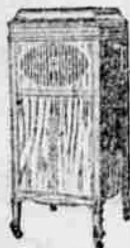

Pest Reporting Service Started

CORVALLIS, Ore., May 7.—Fruit-growers and farmers of Oregon will be supplied with information to aid them by a national pest reporting service now being developed.

The federal board of entomology at Washington, D. C., has appointed A. L. Lovett, entomologist for the Oregon experiment station as entomological collaborator for the state of Oregon.

Monthly reports of pests throughout the state will be turned in to the experiment station. They will be sent in by assigned district pest reporters.

M'Nary Furnishes Relief For Farmers

WASHINGTON, May 7.—Relief for irrigation farmers of the west is provided in a resolution by Senator McNary of Oregon, which was passed by the senate today. It provides that users of water from the government irrigation projects who now owe for water already furnished shall not be cut off from the water this year and shall continue to receive water, notwithstanding arrears. It will permit many farmers to continue operations this year who would otherwise have to quit business, McNary said. House action is now necessary.

The United States fish hatchery located on Yellowstone lake were planted in small streams around the lake and in other waters in the park. The species planted were Eastern brook, rainbow, and black spotted trout.

Fishing at Fishing bridge, at the Yellowstone lake outlet, was excellent all last season and tourists who had the time and inclination to make trips some miles from the main roads never failed to bag the limit of twenty. A twenty-pound mackinaw trout was caught with hook and line in the Snake river not far from the south entrance, September 21, 1920.

Oregon Wool Assn. Starts Campaign

price has been offered for all, based usually upon the value of the poorest fleeces in the sack. The man using scrub bucks and producing poor wool under the inefficient system of marketing, has received just about as much as the careful breeder.

"The methods of getting farm flock wools into the channels of trade have also been unsatisfactory. These wools in the past have been picked up by traveling peddlers who sold them to local warehouse men or merchants, or perhaps a representative of the Boston wool warehouse with an office in Portland would finance two or three large buyers situated in various sections of the state. These men would employ smaller buyers to cooperate in each county; these county men would arrange with local warehouse men or merchants to buy and sell the wools of their locality. Each handler got from one to five cents per pound out of the transaction for the service he performed.

"The remedy for all these evils is for wool growers to conduct their own strong central marketing agency. Australian and Canadian powers have done it, and more recently Ohio, Michigan and Missouri growers have successfully marketed the flock clips of their respective states. The Oregon Wool and Mohair association is being formed by progressive wool growers with the assistance of expert wool men, extension officials and the bureau of markets. Its plan of organization has been carefully worked out from an extensive study of the existing marketing organizations, and it is conceded by wool men to be the best wool marketing plan thus far evolved."
