Nation's Hospital
Keep Open House

CHICAGO, May 11. (United Press)—Centrals in every section of the United States will observe tomorrow (May 12) in memory of Florence Nightingale, pioneer in modern nursing methods.

The anniversary of the birth-date of the famous nurse has been designated as National Hospital Day. President Harding, Surgeon General Cummings and governments of many states are cooperating.

Thousands of hospitals will keep "open house." Invitations will be issued to the public to "come in" and look the hospitals over, to get a better idea of the amount and scope of the work and the care and treatment of sick and injured.

Hospitals will arrange their own programs, governed by local conditions. In many cities graduation exercises for nurses schools will be held. Surgeon General Cummins has directed the commanding officer of each of the sixty-seven government hospitals, where are quartered 26,600 disabled war veterans, to open the institution doors to the public. By this method the government hopes to refute the complaint that war veterans are neglected and mistreated.

General details of National Hospital Day are being directed by Matthew O. Foley, Chicago, executive secretary of the National Hospital Day committee. State directors in more than forty states and four Canadian provinces have been appointed.

CHICAGO, May 11. (United Press)—Horse sense is the greatest single factor in a successful marriage, says Mrs. Catherine Waugh McCulloch, Chicago woman lawyer. She believes this so thoroughly that she advocates a certificate of good sense for prospective brides and grooms.

Such certificate, Mrs. McCulloch said, should be required along with a health certificate, prior to the issuance of the marriage license.

"Women should share equally in administration of the family purse," said Mrs. McCulloch. "Therefore they should have some real horse sense."

(News-Review Washington Bureau.) WASHINGTON, May 10.—Despite the protests of the wool growers of Oregon and other wool centers of the United States, the secretary of war has approved the plan of the department for auction of wool now owned by the war department. He justifies his action by saying that the price of wool has gone up and that the war department should take advantage of this opportunity to get rid of its surplus.

It is expected that Senator Stanford of Oregon, Gooding of Idaho, and other western senators will make another effort to prevent the selling of this wool at this time and further depress the market.
