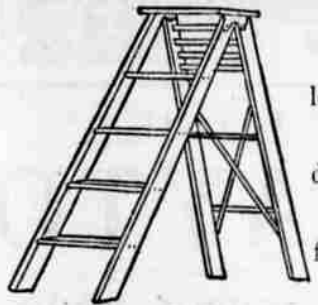

Oregon System Laws All Held Beyond Attack

(News-Review Salem Bureau.)

SALEM, Or., May 14.—(Special.)—Any doubt that may have existed about the power of the Oregon primary and corrupt practices laws, or their ability to stand up in any court, is brushed away by the decision of the United States supreme court in the Newberry case. Senator Truman H. Newberry was prosecuted and convicted under the federal corrupt practices act. The United States supreme court set aside the conviction and declared the federal corrupt practices act unconstitutional.

Relative to the Oregon corrupt practices act the following reflections, backed by the best legal minds of the land, serve to establish its unquestioned potency.

The federal constitution is a grant of power. Congress may enact such laws as the constitution says it may enact, and no other. The federal constitution does not say congress may enact a corrupt practices law. Hence the law was declared unconstitutional in the Newberry case.

Act Plainly Sanctioned.

The state constitution, unlike the federal constitution, is a limitation of power. That is, the state legislature may enact any law that is not prohibited by the United States constitution. There is no prohibition in the constitution against a state corrupt practices act. This alone would serve to give validity to the Oregon law, even if the state constitution did not go further. But it does go further, and expressly directs the legislature to enact legislation to prevent corrupt practices relative to elections. (Article 2, sections 7 and 8.)

The Oregon corrupt practices act then has the plain sanction of the state constitution and does not conflict with the federal constitution.

In the decision of the United States supreme court, however, there was a division of opinion, with four of the nine justices holding the federal corrupt practices act constitutional. They were Chief Justice White and Associate Justices Pitney, Clarke and Brandies.

Opinions Differ.

They, apparently were reasoning under article 1, section 4, of the federal constitution, which provides that "the times, places and manner of holding elections for senators and representatives shall be prescribed in each state by the legislature thereof; but the congress may at any time by law make or alter such regulation, except as to the places of choosing senators."

Apparently the four justices held that this section would warrant congress in imposing a federal corrupt practices act. The other five justices apparently held that such an interpretation would give congress a power over primary elections, which under the seventeenth amendment to the federal constitution, the direct election amendment, it is not supposed to have.

According to press dispatches, the court's decision was that the direct election amendment does not affect article 1 of section 4, which, the majority opinion said, while it gives congress the power to regulate the manner of holding elections, does not confer on it authority to control primaries or conventions.

Opinion is Cited.

One of several notable court opinions that distinguish between the character of the federal constitution and that of the state constitution, and which has an application in the present situation, is that of former Justice Will R. King of the Oregon supreme court in the case of state vs. Cochran, written in 1909. This opinion contains the following language:

"The constitution of a state, unlike that of our national organic law, is one of limitation, and not a grant of powers, and any act adopted by the legislative department of the state, not prohibited by its fundamental laws, must be held valid; and this inhibition must expressly or impliedly be made to appear beyond a reasonable doubt."

"The foregoing principles appear so well settled by a unanimity of decisions, not only in other jurisdictions, but in the courts of this state, since its inception, that they may be deemed elementary; but, since the construction so earnestly relied upon by the plaintiff would necessitate a disregard of the foregoing principles, we deem it appropriate to call attention to a few declarations of our courts upon the subject."

Authority Given.

"Before doing so, however, we quote from that eminent text-writer and jurist, Judge Cooley, who, as an exponent of constitutional law, has no superior. In his work on 'Constitutional Limitations,' he states the rule as follows:

"It is to be borne in mind, however, that there is a broad difference between the constitution of the United States and the constitution of the states as regards the powers which may be exercised under them. The government of the United States is one of enumerated powers; the governments of the states are possessed of all the general powers of legislation. When a law of congress is assailed as void, we look in the national constitution to see if the grant of specified powers is broad enough to embrace it, when a state law is attacked on the same ground, it is presumably valid in any case, and this presumption is a conclusive one, unless in the constitution of the United States or of the state we are able to discover that it is prohibited. We look for grants of legislative power, but in the constitution of the state to ascertain if any limitations have been imposed upon the complete power with which the legislative department of the state was vested in its creation. Gardiner Passes Mark Set For Salvation Army Home Service Fund Drive

In spite of adverse conditions, the Salvation Army drive, in Gardiner has been put over the top, according to word received by N. Rice, county chairman, from Fred Assenheimer, who served as chairman in the Gardiner district. The quota for Gardiner was \$91 and the amount contributed was \$110.60.

"Regardless of the slump in the lumber industry, which materially affects the business of our little town, the people of Gardiner responded splendidly to the Salvation Army S. O. S. call," Mr. Assenheimer reports. "The memory of the Salvation Army lassie, who so patiently and cheerfully served coffee and doughnuts to the boys close behind the fighting lines, can never be effaced from the minds of the American doughboys. Since the Armistice was signed the Salvation Army is still 'carrying on' in administering cheer and assistance not only to the needy in our big cities, but also to many of our boys who fought 'over there' who on returning home found their positions filled and new ones practically impossible to find. In many cases boys with wound stripes on their sleeves and otherwise

physically unfit, finding themselves without work or funds, have been given material aid and encouragement by the Salvation Army workers. Wherever there is suffering or distress there we find regardless of conditions, the Salvation Army workers patiently and efficiently on duty. In view of such a record the organization must be given support even at personal sacrifice."

The Salvation Army campaign at Gardiner was conducted by a committee composed of Mr. Assenheimer, Mrs. A. L. Perkins, Mrs. T. A. Richmond, Mrs. Assenheimer and Harry Bohm.

Mr. Assenheimer states that he wishes to publicly thank all who contributed so liberally to the home service fund, and also the committee of solicitors whose efforts aided in the work.

N. Rice, county chairman, expressed his appreciation of the work done in the Gardiner district and adds his thanks to that of the local chairman for the liberal response in the locality which in spite of local hardships and unemployment has responded so nobly to the work.

Sutherland Items Of Much Interest

SUTHERLIN, Ore., May 14.—A serious accident was narrowly averted here Tuesday morning when the state street bridge, which spans Sutherland creek, went down under the weight of one of the large Standard Oil trucks. The driver succeeded in maintaining a hold with the truck on the south span of the bridge just as the north span collapsed and fell to the river bed, ten feet below. Investigation showed that the wooden stringers of the bridge were rotten.

E. H. Rethwill has just completed the construction of an apple storehouse on his orchard tract east of town. The new building is 14x30 feet, and will be used for storing and packing apples.

James Russell, of Wenatchee, Wash., has purchased the Adolph Lenz home and orchard tract south of town, and will move here next week with his family and household goods.

The Clark and Henry construction company expects to complete its Pacific highway construction contract north of Oakland early the coming week. About 1200 feet remains to be completed. The company will then concentrate its full force on its contract between Sutherland to a point just south of Wilbur, a distance of over five miles. A large portion of this work has been done, and it is estimated that the entire section will be completed in August.
