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THE INFLUENCE OF PAINT.

In former times some business men used to like to have a shabby looking old sign, and they were in different if their store fronts did look faded and worn. These appearances suggested that they had been in business a long time, and gave an air of respectable antiquity to their enterprise. But that time has long gone by.

Along with the clean up idea, the paint up campaign is going over the country. The influence of paint is subtle, and you cannot tell just where it ends. Of course there is the physical truth that a well painted building does not decay and will last many years more. Then there is the fact that paint brings financial credit. The banker would go along with leading money to a household or who did not keep his dwelling well painted. But a neat fresh color is a kind of guarantee that the building is going to be kept up. Insurance men say that property that is kept painted is likely to be a better fire risk.

Then there is the influence that paint has on a community. If you could take a seedy looking city and paint every building that needed it, the mental attitude of that town would change. The place would look more alive and go ahead. Business men would feel more confident in its future. They would have more courage to go ahead and plan enterprises based on its growth. And a community in which hope prevails is one that is going to make progress.

Further more, paint attracts trade. When people from the surrounding country come into a town kept neatly painted, they feel that the place has the spirit of enterprise, and that it is a good center for their business relations. They are similarly repelled from a place that is not kept up. Everyone who paints his buildings this season is helping to maintain the appearance and substantial progress of his home town.

The national conference on city planning recently published a review of the city planning movement. This shows that 148 cities and towns have adopted such plans and have commissions already at work. In hundreds of others the idea is being discussed, and has led to some planning for future growth. Park and playground acquisitions, and im-

provements to the street system, are the principal results accomplished in many places. People who show no foresight in their own personal affairs, see no reason why a city should look ahead. But no community can expect to grow in the most attractive way unless it lays out the lines of its development. Money can often be saved the taxpayers by taking land that is going to be needed for public purposes, before exorbitant prices are asked for the same. Roseburg needs a city planning commission to oversee the development of the place and make sure that its growth is along the most desirable lines.

If you look into the school rooms in some places, you would see tired, bored looking youngsters leaning on their elbows, trying or pretending to study, but not really doing anything. If you visit corresponding schools in some other places, you find children so keenly interested that they are willing to stay after school to finish their tasks. Manifestly the latter kind of school can accomplish two or three times as much for its pupils. What makes the difference? One thing that creates this keen interest is providing some form of hand work to take part of the time of children who do not take easily to books. It is wonderful how you can awaken the dormant energies of a backward boy, by giving him some manual task that his undeveloped mentality can grasp and find pleasure in conquering.

Oregon Apples May Use Canal Route to East

(News-Review Washington Bureau.)

WASHINGTON, May 23.—Oregon apple growers will be asked to cooperate with the apple growers of Washington and the citrus growers of California in utilizing the Panama canal and the new refrigerator ships now being developed, for the shipment of large quantities of Oregon fruits, particularly apples, direct to Europe through the canal. Shipping agents have arranged for many thousand carloads of citrus fruits and northwestern apples to be handled in this manner.

Before the war American apples from the northwest had a big market in England and other parts of Europe, but practically all of this shipment was made overland to New York and thence by boat to Europe. War broke out just when the Panama canal was ready to use, and no practical development of this service was ever made until a few weeks ago when the first shipment of California fruit went through the canal in an experiment to test the best way of shipping.

Since then, the steamer Charles H. Cramp has been converted into a floating laboratory, plying between the Pacific coast and the eastern seaboard through the canal, to determine the best conditions for the handling of citrus fruits as well as the apples of the northwest.

Recently a shipping firm in California has closed a contract in Washington for the transportation of several thousand carloads of Washington apples to the Atlantic seaboard at much lower than the rail rates. This is preliminary to direct shipments to England and Europe as soon as direct arrangements may be made for handling the product on the other side. It is predicted by export transportation men here that northwest apple men will regain their European market immediately, but that hereafter all shipments will be direct by water.

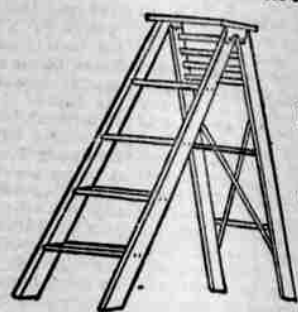
