CAMBRIDGE, Mass., May 28.—The championship of the colleges of the country on track and field went today to the west for the first time in athletic history. Fruit Company Locates Here

Arrangements were completed today whereby the W. B. Glafke company is to open up a warehouse and office in this city. An agreement has been reached with the farm bureau whereby the company will take over the warehouse on Winchester street formerly occupied by the Umpqua Valley Fruit Union and will establish permanent headquarters there. The farm bureau will also maintain its exchange there, but as its season does not conflict with the fruit season, neither organization will hinder the other's work. C. A. Brand, who is now local representative of the organization, will serve as manager, and a man will be employed to attend to the warehouse work at all times. There is sufficient room in the building for the storage of boxes and the handling of fruit. Boxes and other supplies are expected soon, and the company has taken immediate possession of the building and is making it ready to receive the goods. This company handled all of the Overland orchard apple crop last year as well as the produce from many other orchards, and this year has already signed up the crop from about 400 acres of the best fruit orchard in the valley. The company handles all kinds of fresh fruit and is considered one of the biggest concerns of its kind in the country.
