GRANTS PASS, May 29.—That the wreck Wednesday of the Grants Pass and Medford auto bus two miles south of here was due to careless driving at a rate of speed unlawful in the state, was a verdict returned by the coroner's jury at an inquest held at 2 o'clock yesterday in the court room of the Josephine county courthouse.
