Submitted by the legislature—LEGISLATIVE REGULATION AND COMPENSATION AMENDMENT—Purpose: To establish the duration of the legislative session at not more than sixty days and of an extra session at not more than twenty days; fixing compensation of members thereof at five dollars per day and three dollars for every twenty miles traveled in going to and returning from their place of meeting upon the most usual routes; prohibiting introduction of any bills after the fortieth day of the legislative session, except appropriation bills and bills pertaining to defense of the state or nation except by consent of four-fifths of the members present, obtained on roll call. Submitted by the legislature—WORLD WAR VETERANS' STATE AID FUND, CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT—Purpose: To issue bonds not to exceed three per cent of the assessed valuation of all property in the state to raise money to be loaned in amounts of not more than \$4,000 or paid as a bonus of \$15 for each month of active service but not exceeding \$500 to each honorably discharged resident of Oregon who served in the United States army, navy or marine corps, between April 6, 1917, and November 11, 1918; to levy an additional annual tax of two mills to pay principal and interest of such bonds; and ratifying correlative legislative enactments. Submitted by the legislature—HYGIENIC MARRIAGE EXAMINATION AND LICENSE BILL—Purpose: To require both applicants for marriage license to submit to and pass an examination by a regularly licensed and competent physician as to their health, in regard to contagious or communicable venereal disease and mental, and in case of failure to pass such examination prohibiting marriage unless one or both applicants are rendered sterile; to establish requirements of physician's certificate and providing for an appeal from order of county clerk denying a license. Submitted by the legislature—WOMEN JURORS AND REVISED JURY LAW—Purpose: To permit women to serve as jurors; to provide a special notice by which women may release themselves from jury service; to require the names of qualified jurors to be ascertained from the latest tax roll and registration books and any other sources of official information; to require the proportional selection of jurors to be made from the registration books as well as from the assessment roll; to require at least one-half of the trial jury to be women in criminal actions involving a minor under eighteen years of age either as defendant or complaining witness. Dear Mrs. Ellsbury: We are two girls in a small town. There are two boys in a town nearby who would like to go with us and we would like to get acquainted with them. We have seen them several times and they appear to be nice boys, but we have not had any introduction nor have we carried on any conversation with them. Our mothers do not care if we go with nice boys, as we are quite old and have had experience. What can we do to become acquainted? We do not go to public dances or other places where we can get an introduction. We don't go to the same church. Please advise us.

When crossing a street in a small town should the boy take the girl's arm or should they just walk across without assistance?

Should boys and girls of our age (sixteen and seventeen) go in swimming together if our folks don't care? Should the girls wear stockings?

A. If the boys really want to meet you they will find some way to get an introduction. That is up to them and not to you. You have done right in not speaking to them. They will respond if you do and it will probably lead to friendship, but they

will not have the same respect for you that they would otherwise. If you discover a mutual friend you might mention that you would like to meet these two boys, but do not make any other advances.

It is considered quite polite for the boy to take the girl's arm when they are crossing the street, even in a small town, and also for him to assist her up and down the curbs, although it is not necessary and is merely a form. A boy is not necessarily impolite or lacking in the social graces if he does not do it.

It would be better for you to have a chaperone when you go swimming with boys of your age. There is no necessity of your wearing stockings with your bathing suit if it is sufficiently modest.

You should both take plenty of exercise in the open air. If you are unusually thin this will serve to cause you to put on flesh, and it will also cause you to reduce if you are too fat. The thin one should also take plenty of rest. Drink milk, eat eggs and other fattening foods. The fat one should exercise more, eat no sweets or pastry of any kind.

Twilight League Resumes Games

Baseball in the Twilight League was resumed last night. The opponents were the Southern Pacific and the Presbyterian teams. The game resulted in a score of 8 to 3 in favor of the Presbyterians. During the game quite a wrangle came up over a play in which a base runner was going from second to third. A ball was thrown to Campbell as third, and he had a fine opportunity for a play on the runner. Campbell made no attempt to touch the runner, but Whipple, who was running also went outside the line so as not to interfere with the fielder fielding the ball. The S. P. men claimed that Whipple was out for running out of line, and the argument continued long enough for the umpire to call the game. Some of the S. P. men wanted to quit, claiming they could not play against the umpire as well as the team of opponents. The same play came up the other day between the Christian and

Southern Pacific in which a Southern Pacific runner clearly interfered with shortstop Orr fielding the ball, and the hit was allowed. Rule 56, section 7, says: "If in running from first to second base, from second to third base, or from third to home base, he runs more than three feet from a direct line between a base and the next one in regular or reverse order to avoid being touched by a ball in the hands of a fielder. But in case a fielder be occupying a base runner's proper path in attempting to field a batted ball, then the base runner shall run out of direct line to the next base and behind said fielder and shall not be declared out for so doing." Rule 54, section 5, says, "A man is entitled to his base if he be prevented from making a base by the obstruction of a fielder, unless the latter have the ball in his hand ready to touch the base runner." A note on this rule says, "the runner must be given a clear path unless the fielder has the ball waiting for him." Whipple was in his right to run out of line so as not to interfere with Campbell, but should have run behind the fielder. If Campbell had made his play on Whipple and Whipple run out of line, then Whipple

would have been out. But Campbell elected to play for the man on first and the only way Whipple could be declared out would be for running in front of the fielder, instead of behind him.
In the game in which the runner clearly interfered with Orr handling the ball, the runner would have been declared out. But the game of last night was an interesting one, and for several innings was nip and tuck. The score remained four to three through the fourth inning. In the fifth and sixth the Presbyterians added the other four runs that gave them the win, though they had the game in hand as the S. P. boys made no more scores after the third.
