other taxable property, such as timber lands, railroads, public service corporations, cities and towns will pay approximately 72 per cent of the whole.

Therefore, we the undersigned, respectfully urge the utmost conscientious consideration of the proposed bond issue to the voters of Douglas county.

We have carefully investigated into the finances of this county and believe it absolutely imperative to the future development of our county to provide funds and resources to meet not only the requirements of the State Highway Commission, but to build up the important market roads leading at right angles to the Pacific highway, and to also open and complete immediately the two roads leading to the coast. We fully realize the responsibility upon us in asking our good people to support this issue, but yet we honestly and sincerely believe that it is for the best interests of the county and of every farmer and voter therein. Good highways to the coast will undoubtedly insure to the benefit of the farmer. It will in time reduce freight rates and open a vast market for our products, to say nothing of the wear and tear that naturally follows to vehicles from a rough highway.

Having great faith in the future of our county and believing that the crisis has been reached and we will receive one hundred cents value for every dollar expended, we honestly and sincerely urge every man and woman within Douglas county to study the condition of our county and the bonding program as outlined, and you will no doubt believe with us that it is absolutely necessary to provide these bonds in order that this comprehensive road plan may be carried out. We cannot be slackers in this cause. We owe also a duty to the unemployed. We must be in a position to take and meet the problems as they present themselves. Therefore, we trust that you will give the utmost consideration to our statement, and when you have satisfied yourself, no doubt you will believe as we do.
