Weekly News Letter From Salem

NEWS-REVIEW SALEM BUREAU
SALEM, Ore., June 2.—(Special).—Representatives of the public service commissions of Oregon, Washington and Idaho will meet in Portland, June 13 and 14, to consider a proposal relative to a joint, equalized rate of rate and accounting for public utilities operating in the three states. A preliminary conference was held in Olympia last week.

Whether the Orchard Water company, successor to the Willow River Irrigation company, has come to its water rights on Willow River in Malheur county in compliance with an original agreement with the state is a question that has been brought to the state water board, which the board has taken under consideration.

The state board of engineers expects will conduct an examination at the Corbett building, Portland, Friday, July 8, for registration of professional engineers. Application blanks may be received from A. B. Rice, secretary of the board, at the address above given. All applications required to be in the hands of the board at least thirty days prior to the date of examination.

Laws enacted by the 1921 session of Oregon legislature, and which are not effective as soon as signed by the governor through having the emergency clause attached, became operative May 25, the expiration of the ninety-day period following the adjournment of the session. A total of 254 laws became effective on that date, having been held up by the referendum. Fifty-eight acts carried the emergency clause.

school fund cannot legally be loaned on land in irrigation districts that has been bonded or that has incurred other extensive liabilities, according to an opinion of Attorney General Van Winkle, written in reply to an inquiry by G. G. Brown, clerk of the state land board. Money already so loaned will not be withdrawn but the loans will not be renewed.

The state board of control has awarded to the firm of Graham & Atkins a contract to construct an industrial building at Oregon School for the deaf and to McPherson & Urban a contract to install the heating system. The bids were \$12,852 and \$1,141.92, respectively.

In reply to an inquiry by Walter H. Evans, district attorney for Multnomah county, Attorney General Van Winkle has written an opinion holding that under the fishing code it is unlawful for an angler to fish with more than one rod and line.

The state treasurer's office has received a check for \$28,000 from the estate of the late John Clark of Multnomah county, the payment being inheritance taxes from the heirs. The valuation of the estate was \$697,000.

The state dog tax law is being tested out in the case of E. Hofer against Marion county, which has been appealed to the supreme court. Hofer challenged the constitutionality of the law.

Sherman county ranks first among all the thirty-six counties of Oregon in educational efficiency over a period of six years prior to this year, according to a statement by J. A. Churchill, state superintendent of schools. Educational and financial measurements are used in making the computation. Sherman is first financially and eighth educationally, but its average is first.
