

# Weekly News Letter From State Capital

(News-Review Salem Bureau.)  
 SALEM, June 4.—The state board has ordered F. A. Elliott, state auditor, to make cruises, under concurrent resolution No. 3, of the 1921 legislature of all lands in the Oregon-California railroad land district that are affected by applications for exchange of privately owned lands. The board has ordered the commissioner of the general land office at Washington that on application be deferred until the cruises are completed and the recommendations made by the Oregon board.

The state board for vocational education has received an invitation from the Portland school board to attend a luncheon in Portland in the near future, when the work of the board will be discussed.

Printing and mailing of the special session of June 7 cost the state a total of \$7953.77. Pamphlets were printed to \$57,223 voters. The cost of printing and binding was \$5,215.15, wrapping and mailing \$1,696.96 and postage \$2572.28.

C. W. Thompson of Portland, who has been appointed teller in the office of the state treasurer, has resumed his duties.

Reorganization of the defunct bank county bank at Prineville will be attempted, state superintendent of banks has issued a charter for the new bank of Prineville which opened June 1. The capitalization is \$50,000 and the officers are J. L. Grupp, president; W. O. Hall,

cashier; George F. Euston, assistant cashier; A. J. Noble, J. M. Elliott and Lake M. Bechtel, directors.

A further step in litigation that has been pending for some time in the controversy between the Central Oregon Irrigation Company and the granting of a temporary injunction by Judge McCourt of Portland, on petition of H. H. Dietrich, representing the settlers against the company and the state desert land board to prevent the board from approving the sale of water in the project by the Central Oregon company.

Two fatal accidents out of a total of 411 industrial casualties were reported to the state industrial accident commission for the week ending May 26. The fatalities were Vlek Wilson, logger of Clifton, Or., and John Cogan, deckhand of Portland.

John Hunziker of Eugene has been employed by the general staff of the Oregon national guard to design and present plans for the proposed new armory at McMinnville, to cost about \$75,000.

A new irrigation district has been organized in Malheur county. It is known as the Westfall district. A reservoir on Cottonwood creek is contemplated.

The Southern Pacific Company has mission tariffs increasing the street car fare in Salem, Eugene and West Linn from 5 to 8 cents. The new rates will be effective in thirty days unless protested, in which case they will be suspended by the commission.

Although retrenchment policies have hit the state hard, and although there is a disposition on the part of business to liquidate, financial forecasts are optimistic and uncertainties are being gradually removed, according to a statement by Frank C. Brawell, state superintendent of banks.

The Big Four Mining Company of Applegate has filed with the state engineering department an application for a permit to appropriate water from the north fork of Steamboat creek for development of 100 horsepower for general mining purposes in Jackson county. Ten second feet will be the requirement.

Other applications have been filed as follows:

By H. Cameron of Wallowa, Or., covering the appropriation of water from an unnamed stream and waste water for irrigation of a two-acre tract in Wallowa county.

By George H. Miller of Halfway, Or., covering the appropriation of water from a spring, tributary of Pine creek for irrigation of a five-acre tract in Baker county.

By N. K. West of La Grande, covering the appropriation of five second feet from End creek for irrigation of 423 acres of land in Union county, near La Grande.

By Martin Koenig of Garibaldi, Or., covering the appropriation of water from Cannery creek for domestic purposes, in Tillamook county.

By Charles E. Miller of Oak Grove, covering the appropriation of one second foot from Andrews spring, tributary of Willamette river, for irrigation of ten acres and for livestock use in Clackamas county.

## SEVERAL NEW GAME LAWS LISTED

Game Warden Walker Picks Out New Sections of Law For the Sportsmen.

## IGNORANCE NO EXCUSE

Method of Hunting and Fishing Regulated—Open Season for Trout and Deer Given.

Deputy Game Warden Ed Walker today stated that he is desirous of all sportsmen familiarizing themselves with the game laws of Oregon and in order to give publicity to several of the new codes he has requested the publication of some sections.

Ignorance of the law will excuse no one, but Warden Walker is taking every step to notify hunters and fishermen concerning the law, which is very strict this season. The following excerpts from the game code will be of interest to all:

**Game animals:** The open season on game animals in game district No. 1, deer with horns, from August 20 to October 20 of each year. Bag limit, two such deer during any one season.

**Trout:** Open season from April 15 to November 13. Bag limit, 30 fish or 20 pounds and one fish in any one day, and 60 fish or 40 pounds and one fish in any seven consecutive days; provided, however, that it shall be unlawful to have in possession more than 60 fish or 40 pounds and one fish at one time; provided further, there shall be an open season for trout over ten inches in length in the waters of the Pacific ocean and all the bays, inlets and streams affected by the tidewater thereof, during the months of December, January, February, March and April of each year.

**Method of hunting and fishing regulated.** No person or persons shall within the state of Oregon hunt, pursue, molest, catch, kill or destroy any game birds or game animals of the state of Oregon at any time from any automobile, power propelled vehicle or other mechanical conveyance or by the aid of any lights or light carried thereon or attached any person to have in possession at any time any game birds or game animals of the state of Oregon, or any part of parts thereof, taken in violation of this section.

**Shooting from public highways prohibited.** It shall be unlawful at any time in the state of Oregon to shoot or discharge any gun at any game bird or non-game bird, or game animal from, or while upon, any railroad right of way, or any public road or highway.

Animals and birds doing damage

to property may be killed. On completion of any freeholder of the state of Oregon that any beast or other wild animal or birds of the state are doing damage to his or her property, upon written permission from the state game warden, first obtained, said freeholder shall be permitted, or any game warden may be instructed to kill or capture such animals or birds under such regulations as the state game warden may provide. In case the state game warden shall neglect or refuse to grant such permission for a period of seven days after the complaint is made, then the complainant may kill or capture such animals. Any animals or birds killed under the provisions of this section shall be the property of the state and shall be disposed of in such manner as the state game commission shall direct.

Unlawful to catch trout under six inches. It shall be unlawful within the state of Oregon to angle for or catch or have in possession any trout under six inches in length at any time.

Unlawful to sell game fish. It shall be unlawful to sell, barter or trade or to offer for sale, barter or trade within the state of Oregon any game fish taken from the waters of the said state of Oregon any game fish taken from the waters of the said state, by hook and line, commonly called angling.

He has done much research in this field, and is the author of several published papers on psychological problems.

In the department of chemistry, William Skidmore is retained as a graduate assistant for another year. Mrs. Skidmore was formerly Miss Ella Dillard of Roseburg.

## STRENGTH OF ORANG-OUTANG

Is Properly Braced, It is Said the Animal "Can Easily Bend Almost Anything."

The strength of a full-grown orang-outang is enormous. I have seen one bend a 1-inch steel bar as though it were made of rubber. If he can brace himself properly, with plenty of room to exert his entire strength, he can bend almost anything; but between bending a bar and breaking a rope by pulling, there is a great deal of difference. A rattan rope will hold him, though a simple menagerie cage may not give him any more trouble than a paper hoop.

The strength of the orang-outang, or "wild man," as the name means in Malay, is largely in his arms. The arms of a mias—the breed that we were after in Borneo—measure ten feet or more from tip to tip. The mias type, which is next in size to the gorilla, is somewhat larger than the ordinary breed. It is distinguished by a darker color and by folds of skin at each side of the face. Its body, from shoulders to hips, is about the size of a man's. It has short, undeveloped legs, long fingers and thumbs that are mere stubs.

An orang-outang never travels on the ground when he can swing from tree to tree, and, since there are very few open spaces in the jungle, he seldom reaches ground except when he goes down to get something. He can swing incredible distances, hurtling through the air and catching branches with perfect accuracy.

Orang-outangs usually live in colonies numbering from 40 to 60, and the largest and most powerful is chief. They make their homes on platforms in the branches of trees and they build the platforms by breaking off limbs and putting them crisscross. In mating season the male and female live together, but the couples separate after the young are born. The mother takes care of them and the father goes off about his business.—Charles Mayer in Asia Magazine.

## INSECTS MAKE LEAVES 'WALK'

Queer Creatures Responsible for Odd Belief That Has Long Been Held in Australia.

There are some strange leaves in Australia which the people used to think could walk alone. Whenever there came a gust of wind these queer leaves blew off in a perfect shower. As leaves generally do, they turned over and over, and rested upon the ground. Then they would seem to crawl toward the trunk of the tree from which they fell. Since that time it has been found that these leaves, as they were thought to be, were real insects and lived upon those very trees. Their bodies are thin and flat and their wings veined, just like a leaf. If they are disturbed their legs, which are folded away under their bodies, leave their whole shape exactly like the leaf of a tree, with stem and all. Bright green in the summer, these singular little insects, chameleon-like, slowly change their color to a dingy brown, just like a leaf that has been frosted. It is strange that, with wings, they do not fly, but rather walk or crawl along the ground.

## Queen Liked Her Ale Strong.

The City of London Brewery company, whose premises are offered for sale, claim to be the only brewery in the city of London existing from the time of Queen Elizabeth, and it is quite possible that the queen occasionally sampled their brew. Elizabeth was a specialist in ale. She liked it strong, as witness the plaintive note her host, the earl of Leicester, sent to Lord Burtleigh: "There is not one drop of good drink for her here. We were fain to send to London and Kentworth and divers other places where ale was; her own beer was so strong that there was no man able to drink it."

## Testing Material in Cloth.

Mixtures of cotton and wool may be tested by raveling a bit of cloth and burning two of the threads, one running with the selvage, the other crosswise to it. The cotton thread burns quickly with a flame and smells like wood; wool chars slowly without a flame and smells like burning hair. Shoddy, or remanufactured wool, is often used with wool. This can be detected by raveling out a bit of the material, when short broken fibers may be seen. In general, a woolen material which has cotton in it will become more wrinkled when wet than all-wool goods.

## Ancient Zoological Gardens.

Records show that King Nezahualcoyotl had zoological gardens in Texcoco, Mexico, in the middle of the Fifteenth century, and in the next century Cortez found aviaries and fish ponds at Itzapalapan. Montezuma II, emperor of Mexico in the beginning of the sixteenth century, had large collections of animals in the gardens of his capital.

Almost all of the modern zoological gardens date from comparatively recent years, and contain large collections of fine animals, more suitably housed than at any time in the history of the world.
