Elaborate Type and Trimming Mark Shoes for This Summer



The shoe this season is about the only part of the costume which falls to carry out the rule of strict simplicity. It is true that not much can be done to the ordinary walking shoe in the way of elaborate trimming, but all that can be done—cut-out pieces that reveal the stocking, inserts of contrasting leather, high tongues of odd materials—all these things have been introduced to make the shoe for spring and summer attractive.

The very short vamp is seen in some models, but its popularity seems to be on the wane. The very long shoe is nowhere to be seen in the smarter shops. The season's choice seems to be a happy medium—a shoe fairly rounded of toe and long enough to be comfortable, but not an inch longer.

The agitation against high heels and the attempts to pass laws forbidding their manufacture has had the usual effect of such attempted bans in their favor. Low heeled shoes have been much in demand for some time, but gradually the heel is being raised again, and in the dressier models, such as worn by Betty Compson, the Paramount Picture star, in the photograph, the heel is high enough to arch the instep.

The white shoes shown at the lower right-hand corner have also a fairly high heel, and the high tongue has the effect of making the vamp look longer than it really is. To make the shoes elaborate enough for the purpose for which they were designed—an evening wedding—there is a tiny square buckle of silver. These shoes are of white brocade. Another shoe for this purpose is shown at the top of the page and has a tongue of wired lace. The high tongue appears too in the walking shoe of black patent leather and tan buckskin. The tongue is held in place by a narrow strap of the buckskin.

To show to what extent the cutting out of the front of the shoe can go, the shoes sketched at the center are little more than a toe and heel fastened on the foot with narrow straps. The straps are edged with white kid and fastened at the side with a buckle and the toe of the shoe is stitched with an odd design. Sport shoes are the most conservative type of shoes there are. Year after year they vary little, for they are generally designed for comfort rather than for attractive appearance. The shoes at the lower left-hand corner combine both these functions. They are of white buckskin and tan leather.

Constructing New Telephone Line

Harvey Q. Brown, of the Douglas Fire Patrol, left this morning for the Cow Creek district, where $\frac{1}{2}$ miles of telephone lines is to be built. This is a district in which between 30 and 40 families reside and where no telephone line has ever been built. Council Holds Lengthy Meeting

Service commission at once for an answer.

The Mayor reported that he had received a letter from W. W. Card well stating his proposition for the auto camp ground addition and that he had ordered the ground for use. The action was ratified and the recorder authorized to draw a warrant for the rental price.

An electric light on South Cobb street was ordered installed.

The committee appointed to confer with the county agent regarding the bridge across the river to Umpqua Park was also instructed to consult the county regarding a short road to connect the lower end of Mill street with the Pacific highway.

The Mayor reported that the central sewer had been broken and had washed out underneath the pavement in front of the Roseburg garage. He reported that he had employed a force of men to excavate the sewer and had found that a large quantity of pipe had been washed out. He has ordered pipe from San Francisco, through a local plumber and the repairs will be made in a few days.

The usual monthly bills and reports of officers were read and allowed.

The quarterly allowance of \$300 was ordered paid to the public library association.

The engineer's report on the re-survey of the Laurelwood sewer was read. The original survey was objected to as being excessive. By cutting down the size of the pipe and the depth of the excavation the cost has been reduced from \$4,000 to \$3,200. As the paving on this section is to cost a very large sum, it was thought best to hold the sewer matter up for further investigation.

The \$12,614.17 worth of improvement bonds for the paving of Spruce and Washington streets was ordered sold to the Umpqua Valley bank. There were four bids submitted, that of the Umpqua Valley bank being the most acceptable. The bonds sold for par and accrued interest.

The mayor reported that he had forced the recent carnival visiting this city to close up its games of chance but that games of skill had been substituted. He stated that in the future he will allow no amusement company of this kind to visit the city until the council has passed upon the application.

An ordinance providing for paving in the Laurelwood addition was read first and second time.

Budget Board Getting Ready for Its Work

(News-Review Salem Bureau.)

SALEM, Ore., June 7.—(Special.)—The machinery under which the new state budget law will be operative is being assembled and oiled up by Secretary of State S. M. A. Koser.

The law became effective May 25. Frank Meredith, of Salem, has been employed to put the act into operation. He has compiled a list of classifications which will appear on blanks to be furnished the heads of all state institutions and departments for monthly reports to the secretary of state, and through him made available to the budget commission. The personnel of the state board of control, which is the governor, state treasurer, comprises the commission.

The list of classifications has the approval of Secretary of State Koser, but the general plan of operation is yet in tentative state and yet to be approved. Mr. Koser is now in the east.

Time to Be Saved.

In brief the budget commission act is designed to save the time of the legislative session, particularly the ways and means committee. All items of all departments going into the budget as presented to the legislature will have had the approval of the budget commission and its recommendation after having been adjusted to the general financial status of the state. While all estimated requirements of the state departments and institutions will have been thrashed out by the budget commission prior to the meeting of the legislature, the commission's action will

not be final.

The ways and means committee will still have power to cut down, add to, and any department head or commission may carry his own ways and means. However, the long drawn out session of the ways and means committee that have characterized the past legislative sessions are expected to be eliminated to a great degree.

Wide Field Covered.

Heretofore the state board of control has been confined largely to passing on only the budget of the ten state institutions over which jurisdiction. The budget commission's jurisdiction "will cover every activity," "public or private," in whole or in part from money disbursed through the state treasury.
