STATE MAY LOSE LAND UNDER PRESENT CLAIM

WASHINGTON, June 5.—Senator McNary has received word that the interior department declines to approve the claim of the state of Oregon for thirty-odd thousand acres in the Warner valley under the swamp land act. The decision is conditional and provides that if the state will file complete claims for all swamp land in that section instead of in piecemeal as heretofore, an examination will be made by a special agent from Portland and a further decision rendered of the whole claim.

His appointment has been endorsed by Senator Shortridge, Senator Stanford, Senator Oddie and it has also the endorsement of Senator McNary.
