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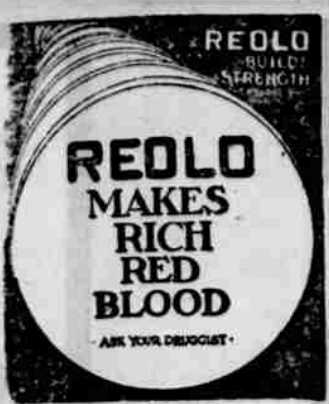
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means to make a fight for every op-

Good Fishing In All Parts of State

There have been numerous re-
quests of the Chamber of Commerce
for further information regarding
fishing conditions in some of our
streams and a second bulletin which
gives fishing spots of this vicinity
may prove of interest.

Reports from the McKenzie and
Willamette rivers are for good sport
for the week end.

Foley Creek and the North and
South Forks of the Nehalem River
report quarter low and clear with a
fair outlook for good catches by
those using royal coachman flies. It
is suggested that you fish down stream.
Foley Creek is six miles from Wheel-
er.

McKenzie river fishermen report
fair catches with a variety of flies
but make particular mention of clue
upright and caddis flies.

Marys river reports water clear
and but few fishermen in this sec-
tion. This stream is within walk-
ing distance of Summit and accom-
modations can be had at that place.

Yaguna river near Toledo reports
the water clear and good catches be-
ing made with spinners.

Yamhill river reports the water is
low and clear with the outlook for
the next ten days fair. Brown hack-
le considered the best fly.

Ten Mile lake reports water clear
and good catches.

Coos river water clear and calm,
with large catches reported Saturday
and Sunday. The stream is reached
by boats and the charge is 75 cents.

North Fork of Umpqua river re-
ports the water clear and salmon
fishing fine. Catches being made by
trotting and spoon hooks. Good
trout fishing at Rock Creek, 25
miles upstream. Good salmon fish-
ing in rivers.

Ashland reports good outlook in
Bear Creek and the fishermen are
using bait.

The Link river district in the vic-
inity of Klamath Falls finds the
fishermen using eggs and spinners
with remarkably good catches in very
clear water.

Smith river territory in the vic-
inity of Gardiner reports catches of
cut-throat salmon trout with worm
and chub bait. Take boats at Gar-
diner.

Willamette and Fall Creek near
Lowell offers a good catch with var-
ious flies. Conditions are reported
at their best in this vicinity. Good
fishing one mile from Lowell and the
creek three miles distant.

The Calapoos out from Albany,
also South Santiam reports good
catches from ten to twelve inches.
Best fishing ten miles out. Accom-
modations at Albany.

The Chamber of Commerce will
continue to give these fishing bulle-
tins if they prove worth while.

REVOLVER INVENTED BY BOY

Idea of Deadly Small Arm Was Born
In the Brain of Fourteen-
Year-Old Runaway.

The revolver, that until the invention
of the automatic pistol, was the most
deadly small arm known to man, was
born of the brain of a fourteen-year-
old boy, Samuel Colt. Colt ran away
from school and shipped on board a
merchant vessel bound for the East
Indies. He had a good deal of idle
time on his hands once the ship was
well at sea, and a long period of calm
weather followed its movements. He
began to seek an outlet for his active
imagination and mechanical urge. He
attempted various things to aid sailing,
but without any great success. He
then took to planning a pistol that
would shoot several times with a
single load. He had only bits of wood
and a jack knife to work with, but be-
fore the voyage was over he had cut
out a model for a revolver very sim-
ilar to the pattern still in use.

Once at home again, he went to
work in his father's factory, but the
revolver idea was still in his head, and
he worked at it from time to time un-
til he was twenty-one. At this point
his experiments had so far advanced
that he asked for and obtained pat-
ents in America and European countries.
A stock company was organized, and
from this humble start the great Col-
t's factory was begun, and the re-
volver put on a market that soon car-
ried it around the world.

SCIENTISTS HOLD TWO VIEWS

Are Not in Accord in Their Explana-
tion of Origin of the Planetary
System.

Scientists explain the origin of our
planetary system in two ways. One
of these is the familiar nebular hy-
pothesis of Laplace. The other is the
planetesimal theory of Professor Mon-
ton, which is probably the most cor-
rect one. According to this theory
our planetary system was originally
a vast spiral nebula. The planets
were formed by accretions of matter
in the spirals of the nebula. Our
earth and its satellite, the moon, were
formed in this way. The moon being
a smaller accretion of matter, was
naturally attracted by the earth, which
was possessed of enough gravitation
to hold the moon. The moon there-
fore is not a child of the earth, but
speaking in everyday parlance, we
might call it an adopted child. This
theory explains a great deal that the
nebular hypothesis does not. There
are vast numbers of such spiral ne-
bulae in the heavens, indicating that
this is nature's accepted way of cre-
ating new worlds, and it is for these
reasons that I accept this view of the
formation of the earth and the moon.

Two Cold Inaugurations.

Two presidential inaugurations es-
pecially marked by cold weather were
those of Taft and Grant (his second).
Thousands of people became sick
from exposure during Grant's second
inauguration, and many died. It is
said the coughing of people who had
colds was so great that the orchestra
at the inaugural ball could hardly be
heard.

The Taft inaugural blizzard began
in Washington the afternoon of March
3, 1909. It continued all night, and
the snow in the capital the next day
was so deep that it seemed impos-
sible to have a parade. But the pa-
rade was held, and on a street swept
clean, thanks to the Washington
street department, which removed
thousands of wagon loads of snow and
slush from Pennsylvania avenue. Many
people became sick from standing in
the snow or sitting in the cold stands
to watch the parade. There was much
suffering caused by exposure. Presi-
dent Taft's reviewing section was in-
closed in glass and heated by elec-
tricity.
