### Suit Filed Against Port of Umpqua

may become valuable building property for the exclusive benefit of the city and Warren Reed.

It is claimed that the territory embraced within the port is already overtaxed, and that with the shutting down of the mills there is no money with which to pay the now existing indebtedness and that many property owners are now unable to pay their regular taxes. The new burden, it is said, would increase the indebtedness to over 10 per cent of the assessed valuation.

As every meeting of the commission, the complaint alleges, was held in secret, it was impossible for any remonstrance to be made at the time, but since then, it is said, petitions have been filed asking that the ordinance passed be submitted to a vote and also a petition has been filed in proper form asking for an election to vote on the repeal of the ordinance. No action has been taken by the commission on either petition, it is claimed. The league, the complaint states, has done all within its power to obtain a joint meeting with the commission and that the commission has refused to meet with the taxpayers and has refused the permission to examine the record books and the minutes of the meeting.

The court is asked to quash the ordinance and enjoin the issuance of the bonds.
