The Fair Fund Is Apportioned

EM, Or., June 21.—Secretary Koser this morning announced the apportionment of the fair fund among the counties. This fund, raised by a one-twentieth of a mill on taxable property in the state, this year aggregates \$44,730.87. Apportioned among the counties amounts equivalent to that of the levy in each county, equal share in the surplus is \$15,000 limit in Multnomah, which this year amounts to \$11.08. Ring Battles of Jack Dempsey and Carpentier

When Dempsey, from training and boxing with men who knew every twist and turn in the game, had absorbed considerable experience, Kearns adjudged him ready for another invasion of the east, this time under more expert supervision.

The trip was a triumph from the start. Dempsey literally fought his way across the continent. Boxing at least once, sometimes twice a week in cities of varying size, he hung up a great record. "Fireman" Jim Flynn, Bill Brennan, Arthur Polkey, Fred Fulton, Porky Flynn and Battling Levinsky were among the victims. The only reverse decision registered against him during the year was a four-round bout on the coast in which Willy Meehan beat Dempsey on points.

The second battle with "Fireman" Jim Flynn was one of the early bouts of the trip. It was staged in a western town and Dempsey knocked out Flynn in the first round, thus avenging the earlier one-round defeat at the hands of the veteran.

An anecdote concerning that battle shows the confidence which Kearns had acquired in his new charge. Flynn's manager, believing that Dempsey again would be an easy victim, offered to wage Kearns an amount on the result. Kearns was willing to wager not only on the result, but that Dempsey would win in one round. The outcome proved the correctness of his calculations.

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Two bouts with leading American welterweights were fought before the close of 1911. In one Carpentier was victorious over Harry Lewis in 20 rounds. In the other, the Dixie Kid, remembered in this country as one of the most furious two-handed welterweights the ring has seen, beat the Frenchman in a five-round bout.

Henry Piet, in 10 rounds, scored the other victory marked up against Carpentier in 1911.

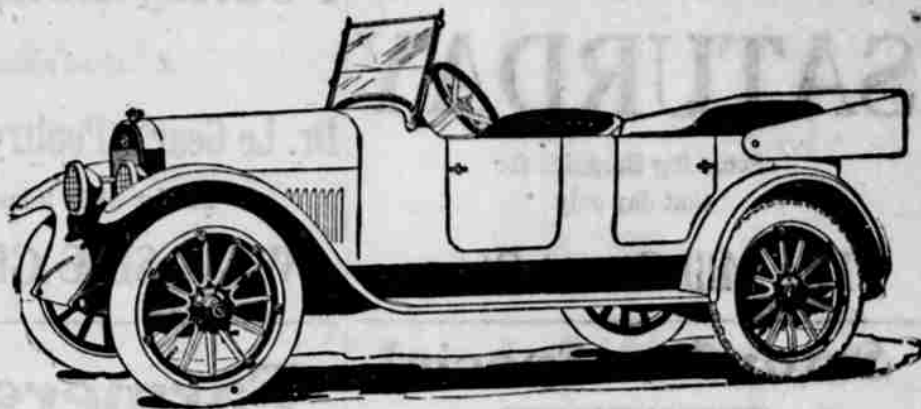
