Explorer Solves Secret Polar Life

Vilhjalmur Stefansson, the noted
Arctic explorer, who is to lecture
here on the second evening of Chau-
taquus, upset all the old theories of
the Arctic during his five years spent
in the polar circles ending in 1918.
Instead of carrying large supplies of
food, he learned to live off the land
on native animals and fish. Instead
of carrying fuel, he burned sea
blubber. Instead of taking a regu-
lar of dogs and a long sledge train,
he and his party traveled with six
dogs and one sledge and he brought
the dogs back "fat as pigs," accord-
ing to his own description.
Instead of being covered with
snow, Mr. Stefansson found the Ar-
ctic hills covered with fertile grass
and capable of affording pasture to
enormous herds of reindeer, the meat
of the future, according to Mr.
Stefansson. In his great illustrated
lecture, "My Five Years in the Ar-
ctic," Mr. Stefansson describes life in
the northern regions in a wealth of
detail as to travel, food, seal hunt-
ing, bear hunting, clothing, difficul-
ties of progress and many other
features.

Mr. Stefansson's first experience in
living off the country was occasioned
by necessity, owing to the destruc-
tion of his ship, Karluk, which car-
ried most of his provisions. He be-
lieved, however, that he could live
off the land and this he and his
party proceeded to do. He studied
the Eskimo and learned to live ex-
actly as the Eskimos lived. He
learned to hunt as the Eskimo hunts
and he learned to build ice houses as
the Eskimo builds them. In this way
he was able to undergo the hardships
of the north and made life and
travel in the Arctic circle compar-
atively simple.

THE PROPOSED ROAD ON THE WEST SIDE OF THE RIVER AT ROSEBURG.

Roseburg, June 23.

Editor News-Review:
The writer has read the account of
the action of the city council in the
matter of a road on the west side of
the river at Roseburg connecting
with the present bridge across the
river at Oak street.

The proposed road, if located,
run through property within the cor-
porate limits of the city of Roseburg.
There may be a question whether
the county can locate a county road
over land within the corporate limits
of the city and over which the city
has the exclusive jurisdiction. It
would be well for the county court
to investigate that matter before an
attempt to locate the road has been
made, and if the road is located,
will the county or the city of Rose-
burg pay the damages if any, to the
owner of the property within the cor-
porate limits of the city, and will the
county or the city keep that part of
the road within the city limits in re-
pair?

It is possible that if that part of
the county road within the city lim-
its may get out of repair and in these
days of travel by automobile, if an
accident occurs on that part of the
road, someone killed or injured, or
property destroyed, will the city of
Roseburg or the taxpayers of the
whole county pay the damages?

The writer is of the opinion that
the taxpayers of the county outside
of the city of Roseburg have reason
to object to the location of roads
within the city at their expense.

Many Enjoy W. C. T. U. Picnic

The ladies of the W. C. T. U. met
at the Bradburn home at Winston
yesterday and over 40 partook of a
bounteous dinner out under the
trees. The day was perfect and ev-
eryone enjoyed it fully. Not many
children were present, but it was a
pleasure to watch them at their play.
In the afternoon they gathered in
the parlors for the program. Rev.
J. C. Jones conducted the devotion,
reading the 40th Psalm, which was
Miss Willard's favorite. He spoke of
the earlier prohibition movement and
closed with an earnest prayer for the
success of all branches of W. C. T. U.
work.

Rev. Warrington gave an interest-
ing address, first telling of Miss
Robertson of Oklahoma, whom he
met recently. The only woman in
congress, in her public service she
stands first as a Christian, second
as an American and last a republi-
can. He said the time for temper-
ance education has not passed. It
should be persistently continued. In
the first ten months of dry enforce-
ment there were 25,000 arrests and
\$22,000,000 collected in fines. Law
breakers are anarchists. Obey and
support the dry law or legally repeal it.

menace in our country. Then there
is the movie problem. He told of

said, "I am proud of the prohibition
victory, but I am not proud of the
time it has taken to win."

There are other great problems to
be met. Tobacco is one of them.
Two billion dollars worth of drugged
tobacco. Think of it, taken to the
bodies of our people. What effort
will it have on future generations.
Your fight is not done. America is
only partially dry. Go out with the
determination to fight and win.
