OregonOld Newspaper
Is On Display

In looking over some old papers, Mrs. Mary E. Mathews, a resident of Rose street, today found a copy of The Daily Banner, of the date of April 27, 1876, the first daily paper published in Roseburg, and at that time the only daily paper in Southern Oregon. The paper was edited by Crane and Flood and the subscription price was 50 cents a month or \$5 a year. There were four pages measuring 5 1/2 by 9 inches in size and carrying two columns, chiefly devoted to advertising. One entire page was taken up by advertisements inserted by San Francisco firms. The news matter consisted of one column write-up of the state democratic convention at which Hon. L. F. Lane was nominated from Douglas county for congress; a challenge from the Oakland ball team for a game to be played on May 1, 1876, which challenge was accepted by the Roseburg, Rosebuds; and an account of the death of Mrs. Mary Livingston. Advertisements were carried for the John Rast brewery, S. W. Crane, general merchandise, Metropolitan hotel, Centennial Saloon, J. Fitzhugh, general merchandise, B. F. Mathews, blacksmithing, Sheridan Brothers hardware and S. Marks and Company, general merchandise.
