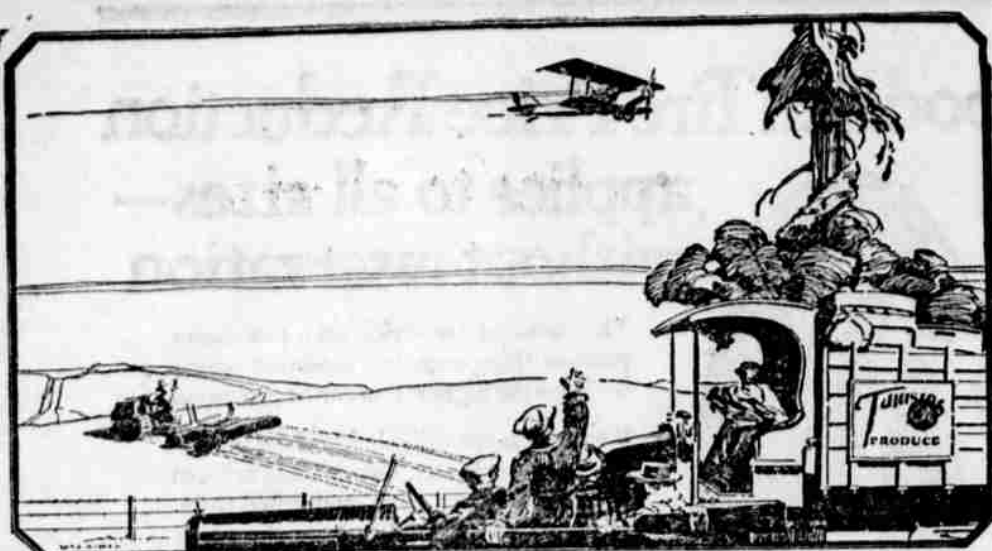

Starts Fund For Electric Sign

Nebo, to advertise Roseburg to the world. Mr. Jones has property here and expresses great interest in the locality. The letter accompanying the check is as follows:

"Chamber of Commerce, Roseburg, Oregon.

"Being a property owner in the vicinity of Roseburg, I take the liberty to make some suggestions to the welfare of the organization of your city. The Chamber of Commerce of the most beautiful city in name in the whole world, Roseburg.

Poets have in ages past woven beautiful sentiments around the 'Rose,' the queen of flowers. In the hour of joy and gladness the Rose gives us good cheer to the happy occasion. When worry overtakes us, it is again the Rose, the queen of flowers that gives us comfort in distress.

The name of 'Rose' has come down to us from our Germanic or Anglo-Saxon tongue unchanged, being then as now with us the most admired flower. Even in the Latin tongue the name 'Rose' has but little change in name. The name and all the beauty of the Rose in color, grace and sentiment in the name of all civilized people. Ring Battles of Jack Dempsey and Carpentier

Carpentier's bout with Gunboat Smith was his last important engagement before he entered the military service. He was in England when the call to arms was sounded and is said to have hurried across the Channel on the first available boat, getting into uniform almost immediately after his arrival on French soil.

Joining the aeronautic corps as a chauffeur, he became pilot in the aviation corps in the spring of 1915. He flew at the front for 18 months before being assigned to reserve pilot duty behind the lines. Later he was declared physically unfit for flight service because of minor wounds received in action.

By his comrades, Carpentier is said to have been a daring flier. For bravery in the air he was decorated with the Croix de Guerre and the Medaille Militaire. The latter award is the most prized that can be given to a French soldier. Carpentier's bravery in flying low over a German fortress during one of the major French offensives resulted in this decoration, according to the official war records, recently investigated.

Carpentier's only boxing during this period was in exhibitions behind the lines for the pleasure of his poilu comrades. The only bout listed in his official record about this time is the exhibition with Jean Bicot in 1917. For some time it was planned to send Carpentier to America to box in exhibitions for the Red Cross benefit, but this was abandoned.

Man Aged Sixty Three is Suicide

MULINO, June 30.—J. D. Wilkerson was found dead in a wooded section along the Molalla river. He took his own life by severing an artery with a knife. Wilkerson disappeared from the home of Mrs. Schaffman, of Mulino, Friday, leaving a note saying that relatives would never see him again. A search was immediately started which resulted in a neighbor named Causon finding the body. The deceased leaves a family. It is believed that the act was caused by despondency over his inability to secure work. He was 63 years of age.

Veteran Fighters To Meet July 2

NEW YORK, June 30.—Veterans of numerous gory ring battles will ace each other in the ring when Jack Dempsey defends his heavyweight title against the challenge of Georges Carpentier in the Jersey City ring, July 2. Through several campaigns, both have won and lost on points in nearly every possible manner. Both have won by knockouts, on points and by fouls; both have lost on points and by knockouts, although Dempsey never lost a decision on a foul as did Carpentier to Frank Klaus, when Manager Desamps climbed into the ring to save the Frenchman from further punishment.

Carpentier, fighting since 1907, is a more grizzled veteran of the two, winning his way up from the bantamweight ranks to the heavyweight class. Carpentier, who started boxing at 14, has engaged in 85 battles, 71 of these he emerged from the ring the victor. Thirty-four times he won by knockouts; 33 times on point decisions and four times on fouls by opponents.

The Frenchman has fought only five draws; has lost once on a foul and has been knocked out once. To a French youth named Gloria goes the credit for being the only opponent who has stood over the challenger and listened to the toll of the referee.

Carpentier's record, before the war, is one of the most active credited to a leading boxer. Service in the French army curtailed his boxing for our years, but since the armistice, with a heavyweight title bout his main consideration, Georges has engaged in fewer glove contests.

Jack Dempsey has fought 64 battles, and 55 resulted in victories for him. The champion has knocked out 15, or almost three-fourths of his opponents in six years of boxing, a remarkable record. Four times he has won on point decisions and his only victory on a foul was over the ponderous Carl Morris.

The champion has fought four draw decisions; has lost on points
