Baptist Claim Lead In League

As a result of last night's 8 to 4 victory over the Presbyterians, the Baptist team claims leadership of the twilight league. No self-respecting score keeper, who has any regard for this reputation for veracity, would attempt to affirm or deny their claim, for with half dozen games protested, several thrown out because of violations of the Sunday ball playing rules, and many others postponed it would require a constitutional investigation to straighten the existing tangle.

However, last night's game was a good exhibition of baseball and was greatly enjoyed. A cold wind blowing over the grounds caused considerable discomfort and made it hard for the players to do their best. On several occasions, the Presbyterians filled the bases but lacked the punch to put over the necessary runs. The game was out to five innings because of the weather.

In the first inning the Presbyterians put two men on bases, Watson going on with a short single, and Richardson, with a three-base hit. Watson was thrown out at the plate having made a slow start in getting away on Richardson's single to the boards. For their first time at bat the Baptists collected on a run Black getting a pass on four balls and being pushed around by a two-base hit by Pickens.

In the second inning, the Presbyterians began hitting the delivery of Carl Black, and annexed three runs and had the bases loaded when Cecil Black took the mound. Cecil Black worked out the difficulty without further scoring. The Baptists then came back with four runs on three bunched singles and two errors.

The Presbyterians failed to score in the third while the Baptists brought over two more runs. In the fourth, the Presbyterians were blanked while Carl Black made the circuit for the Baptists. Whittle lead off man for the Presbyterians, in the fifth inning, scored ending the scoring, although the bases were loaded in that inning.

30,000 SACKS OF ONIONS WILL BE DESTROYED

SAN FRANCISCO, June 30.—A consignment of 30,000 sacks of cold storage onions, valued at \$60,000 is to be thrown into the ocean off San Francisco in the next few days because it has been found impossible to either find a market for the onions or give them away. William J. Burke, deputy county horticultural commissioner, announced today. Fifteen thousand boxes of apples in cold storage, also are threatened with destruction because receipts of fresh apples can take care of the market adequately.
