OREGON GETS BUSY.

Oregon was awakened from a smug contentment by certain embarrassing facts brought to light in the census figures of 1920. These figures showed that the average density of population throughout the United States was 35.5 persons per square mile; for the state of California, 22 per square mile; for the state of Washington, 20.3 per square mile, while Oregon could only boast of 8.28 per square mile. These figures were disconcerting to the complacent and therefore self-satisfied citizens of Oregon.

"Why is it," they asked, "that other states to the north and south and east of us are developing at an enormous rate while we are practically standing still. Questions ceased and investigations began with the result that representatives of the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce are now in the middle west, operating from Omaha as a base, and are grouping together all prospective home-seekers for the purpose of bringing them to Oregon in a body. Special train parties are being arranged for after harvest, thus enabling the middle western farmer to come to Oregon and see for himself the opportunities awaiting him.

While Oregon's land settlement plan as inaugurated this year is an example of the aggressive spirit of the new west, it is also a symbol of the passing of the old order of things. "Go west," said Horace Greeley, and for sixty years the mandate was obeyed. The mandate has changed now: "Come west—where opportunities await you"—is the call. —The Nation's Business.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION.

The chamber of deputies in France recently passed a law requiring physical education of all children through the 16th year. Japan has had physical education of children for 20 years. Sweden has had universal physical education for a very long time. Great Britain provides national co-operation with local communities having physical education. The United States claims to be the most progressive country in the world. Yet it is away behind these other nations in physical training. Not over one tenth of our school pupils have this form of development. Recent school surveys have shown that more than half of the school children are below par physically. The experience of the draft boards demonstrated that one-third of our young men are not physically fit. It seems strange that the United States, which is as rich as when it entered the war, can not do as much for its children as the debt laden nations of Europe. There are differences of opinion as to whether physical education should be a federal or state enterprise, but that is a minor point. The essential thing is to do something to turn out a physically efficient race of young people. A great deal of industrial inefficiency is caused by poor physical condition. The boy or girl who has a half developed body feels perpetually tired. The army did not want him, because he could not stand the strain. He is equally a detriment to a store or a factory. He lacks the mental energy to improve the quality of his performance, and drags along from year to year looking at the clock and hoping for quitting time.

A good many people are talking and writing about "the next war." It is much as if a man who had vainly tried to kill himself, should write an article on "My next suicide." His friends would be inclined to lock him up in a good sanitarium. Nations in a state of partial development like Turkey and Russia may have to fight more wars. But if the more advanced peoples of the world keep on fighting, it would seem as if the human race had gone crazy. Of course, if an aggressive and warlike power arises and attempts to dominate the world the way Germany did, the other powers must check her at all costs. But such a power will figure next time that she will have the world against her. If the powers that want justice and right to be done, will make it clear that no war of conquest on the part of a civilized power will ever again be tolerated, it should be possible to head off any attempt of that kind.

Many people feel that the time the college athletes put into baseball and other sports is wasted. Yet these boys have learned some valuable lessons. It is a big trial on a fellow's temper and self-control, to hold his nerve in one of these contests, with thousands of yelling students trying to rattle him and "get his goat." Those who can keep calm and exercise their usual skill in the midst of such turmoil, have learned one of life's big lessons. Many people fail to make a good impression in business, because they get so cranky when things get hurried and they are called on for extra speed. They become irritable and people dislike to have anything to do with them. If they could have acquired the good athlete's imperturbability, they would handle themselves better in the tense and rushing times of business life.

If it wasn't for the bills rolling in the first of the month this old world wouldn't be such a bad place to live in. But the absence of the bill collector might be supplemented by a worse evil, so let's take it cheerfully—and give likewise.

The first real move toward normalcy in Roseburg is the moving of the Chamber of Commerce headquarters to the ground floor on Jackson street. This will help some, in a publicity way.

The big fight over we can now get down to business. It's funny how the sporting blood of the nation gets "riled up" over a pugilistic encounter—but it does, just the same.

It was a frame building which was used in the old days as a flat center, road house and gambling tavern and was suppressed many times. The fire, one of the most famous gambling figures in the northwest, was once its operator. The place has been used as a public dance hall lately.

Astoria Box Factory Burned

ASTORIA, July 1.—Fire raged through the plant of the Astoria Box factory late yesterday, causing a loss estimated at \$150,000. The sawmill and carpenter shop were totally destroyed. An overheated headbox boxing caused the fire.

Many Roseburg ex-service men who served with the 4th company during the late war will remember the box factory, as it was one of the places where the coast artillery company was on guard for several months. Several plots to destroy the mill were uncovered by government agents who were employed with the workers, and at one time it became necessary to double the guard there to prevent a bombing plot. The local company was an emergency guard outfit and was later received by the U. S. guards. Dr. F. W. Hayes being in command of the company.

Facts on Lives of the Fighters

Born in Salt Lake City in 1895, Jack Dempsey was a roving youngster and didn't see much of school. Started his professional boxing career in 1915 out west. He kept at the game, fighting for small sums, meeting anybody to keep himself in food. Rode the brake beams from place to place. He didn't show much outside of a "pork and beans" class until three years ago.

When he came to New York the first time he was broke. A friend staked him to an overcoat to protect him from the wintry blasts. He fought John Lester Johnson and won the decision. Then he fasted for a long period and was knocked out by Fireman Jim Flynn in what has always been regarded as "one of those things."

Jack Kearns took charge of him and he began to show real form when the war broke out. He did not enlist, but went to the shipyards. Quick knockouts of Carl Morris, Bill Brennan, Bat Levinsky and Fred Fulton enabled him to get a fight with Jess Willard for the world's championship and he won the title in Toledo in 1919.

Georges Carpentier was born in Lens, France, Jan. 12, 1892. Formed a working partnership with Francis Dempsey when he was eight years of age. He became a tumbler and with Dempsey traveled around from town to town doing his tricks in cafes and pushing the hat. Dempsey started him boxing when he was eleven years of age. He started his professional career as a fighter at the age of 15. He won the flyweight, bantam and featherweight championships of France.

He came into prominence by meeting Willie Lewis, Frank Klans, Joe Jeannette, Gunner Smith and Tommy Wells. Was considered by his countrymen as a coming champion.

When the war came he reported with his class (a draft arrangement) in the French army and was assigned to the infantry. Later transferred to the aviation section where he was stationed behind the lines. Was decorated with the Croix de Guerre.

Spent five years in the service and after a rather mediocre showing in a few bouts, jumped into prominence by knocking out Joe Beckett, the British champion, with one punch. Came to America and knocked out Bat Levinsky in four rounds, winning the world's light heavyweight championship. Signed to meet Dempsey for the heavyweight title.

This done, he lay down in the coffin, covered himself with a shroud and fell asleep.

A few hours later a priest arrived and conducted a regular service.

The crowd brought a crowd to the chapel entrance. Eventually some of the bravest ventured inside to ascertain what had happened. They found an empty coffin and a dead man on the floor, and naturally put the corpse into the coffin. They then began to search for the shroud, which the madman had taken away with him. One of the searchers opened the cupboard in the hope of finding something fit to cover the body. Directly he did so the hidden dead man fell on him head first and knocked him down.

The live man fainted from fright, and panic again filled the chapel, the crowd rushing out and scattering through the city. It was only after several hours' work by the police that the matter was cleared up and popular excitement subsided.
