GOTT MIT UNS SLOGAN NOT USED BY HUNS

BERLIN, June 30.—"Gott Mit Uns" is no longer the slogan of the German people. It is the feeling that God abandoned Germany responsible for an increasing tendency for Germany to abandon God? The Berliner Tageblatt attempts to analyze the reasons why Protestants, Catholics and Jews are leaving their churches in increasing numbers.

Godliness is developing in the city, whereas the country districts have lost but few members of their church, finds the Tageblatt. In one year, the Protestant churches in Berlin have lost more than 80,000 members, the total loss of the Protestant churches for all Germany being about 150,000. The total number of members of the Catholic church in Berlin has receded 7000 during

the past year. The Catholics are in the minority in northern Germany.

The number of Jews withdrawing from the synagogue is double the number of resignations before the war, the Tageblatt declares. "The most important reason for the increasing army of dissidents is the increasing church taxes. But also the fact that the broad masses view the Protestant church as the instrument of militaristic Germany, and therefore fight it, plays a large role. The experiences of the war have also had their mark."

"Gott Mit Uns" put not with increased church taxes, summarizes the Tageblatt's investigations.

Communist Plot Is Revealed

DALLAS, Texas, July 1.—Eduardo Herrera, South American, has revealed to the chief detectives a gunning communist plot to assassinate the president of Cuba as well as to invite revolutions in various South American countries. Herrera has applied for police protection, declaring that the plotters are living in Latin quarters in New York hatched the plot, and that he had been invited to join them following his arrival from Colombia. Curiously, he says, impelled him to join the revolutionary society, and he heard the plot planned to kill President Zayas, as well as the revolution talk. The society chose Herrera as messenger to acquaint the Havana communist societies with the plot. He escaped, was followed and threatened with death, and says the communists are now on his trail.

Will Assume Personal Responsibility

(By United Press.)

WASHINGTON, July 1.—President Harding and Budget Director Dawes will assume personal responsibility in holding down government expenses, and no official will be permitted to spend more money than allowed him in the budget, without the consent of the President Director Dawes. The latter explained his plan of expense cutting at a meeting today at which the president was present. "I will ask each department for an estimate of the amount of money needed for their particular office," Director Dawes said, "and all money appropriated above the estimate will go into a reserve fund. Each official will be held responsible to the president for the strictest economy, and the over-spending of the estimates made will be a difficult matter."
