REACTION AGAINST LOPPING CROWNS

Quite a Few Kings Still Hang Around Europe, Despite Effects World War.

SUPPORTS ARE WOBBLY

Hungary and Austria Still Kingdoms and Germany Shows Strong Leaning—Holland Is Most Stable Throne of All.

LONDON (By Mail.)—The sport of lopping crowns in Europe, that became so exhilarating in the war, seems not only to have subsided, but also to have been followed by its equal and opposite reaction.

Hungary, though kingless, is by legislation of its own parliament, still a kingdom. Austria has a small but important royalist party. And Germany manifests a strong leaning towards a king, and a Hohenzollern at that.

Constantine has come back, though the royal supports are wobbly. Old King Peter of Serbia, who pulled through the war more or less, has found his new kingdom of the Serbs, Croats and Slovenes so pregnant with spontaneous combustion that he leaves his son, Alexander, to do most of the work. Ferdinand of Rumania still has his picture on the postage stamps, but is refraining from all other publicity. And Boris of Bulgaria, answering a public welcome on a church festival the other day in Sofia, was greeted by a bomb which killed and wounded several persons close to him.

The thrones most familiar to Americans are at present having little difficulty in weathering fair winds. In England King George has lost by his quietness what little vestige of power his father by his strong personality was able to exercise. His popularity was undergoing a slump until the Prince of Wales came to bat. The Prince is undoubtedly the most popular person in the United Kingdom and if he comes to the throne, which some people though admiring him doubt, he will probably wield a positive influence.

The most stable throne of all, apparently, is that of Holland. Queen Wilhelmina enjoys and cherishes the genuine affection of her people. The Prince Consort, Henry of Macklenburg, is not popular, but the Queen drives about The Hague in her car with no guard. The men in the streets tip their hats and she bows pleasantly. There was an attempt not long ago to hold a demonstration against her, but she drove without any guard to the place where it was to be held and the Hollanders took the horses from her carriage and drew her through the streets in triumph.

King Albert of the Belgians also reigns with comparative quiet. King Victor Emmanuel of Italy, however, is in none too good a position though it has shown signs lately of strengthening. The King of Spain, also, manages to hang on.

The question of a king for Hungary is the puzzling one. Karl is the regally crowned monarch. After his recent fall his supporters in Hungary insisted that he would be back in six months and the announcement that he is about to go to Spain gives some credence to the opinion that he may try another coup, because in Switzerland he is very closely guarded. He has put himself in a rather ridiculous position, however, by having left Hungary twice now, each time after proclaiming that he would rather die than leave. Besides, the little entente, supported, though somewhat casually, by the big one, is determined not to have a Hapsburg on the throne. He is, further, a Catholic, and while the Catholics are strong in West Hungary, a large part of the country is Calvinistic.

Since Karl's last departure several rivals have sprung up. Admiral Horthy, designated governor by the parliament until a king was selected, was, according to stories in Vienna, himself to have been set up by the Small Landowners party as king. That, however, fell through. Archduke Joseph and Archduke Albrecht both have strong followings.

In Austria, in spite of the royalist party and the members of the nobility, who keep their titles only by courtesy and persistence, the chances of a kingdom are small. Many people, however, remember the good times before the war and think they would come back automatically with a restored monarchy.

VACATION CLUB ON WAY TO CAMP IN ONTARIO'S "A COZY CABIN IN THE PINES"

How would you like to own an island in the Northland, an island holding a snug summer cabin; there is no reason why you should not own one if the idea appeals to you. Ontario's vast waterways contain countless islands of all sorts, shapes and sizes. Most of them belong to the provincial government and are for sale at ridiculously low figures. Ten dollars per acre is the average price. As many of the islands are less than an acre in extent you may purchase one of them for a nominal sum.

In the French River district, so well beloved of sportsmen, are many island dotted lakes. Most of these waters are little visited and well stocked with fish. Trout Lake reached by an eight all boat ride from Parry station, is noted for its excellent fishing and scenic beauty. This beauty is due in large measure, to the pretty islands. Some of them have been used for several seasons by camping parties, but nearly all still belong to the government and hence are available for purchase.

Working northeast from Trout Lake, the wide expanse of Lake Nipissing is entered. Here are many islands with fine beaches. One of the larger of these islands will hold a boys' camp this summer. Crossing Lake Nipissing, the town of North Bay is reached. This is the gateway to a lake region that stretches northward. Timagami Lake, 72 miles north of North Bay, an octopus-like lake with nine long arms, contains 1,600 islands. Count 'em. They have all been numbered by the government. They range in size from a few square feet holding a lone pine, to Timagami with its 3,000 acres of forest trees.

Timagami's islands provide sites for many charming summer homes. There are a number of Cleveland and Pittsburgh families among the summer colony. The area of Lake Timagami is 85 square miles, exclusive of its islands. This insures against the possibility of crowding, even though several hundreds of families make their summer homes there. Bear Island, 13 miles from Timagami station, boasts an Indian Village and a Hudson's Bay Post and is the center of island life. Several launch services afford ample means for getting about for those who do not have their own launches. Fishing and scenery are all that could be desired. Bass, lake trout and trout are plentiful. A boat trip among the islands presents a kaleidoscopic picture with ever changing vistas of green and blue beauty.

Government Makes Survey Aircraft

(By Associated Press.)
NEW YORK, July 5.—The manufacturers' Aircraft association, on completing an aviation survey of the United States, announced today that in the last six months, the 1,200 commercial planes in operation in this country had flown approximately 3,250,000 miles.

"The record," says the survey, "shows that civilian flying although hampered by the lack of an American air policy, has established itself as remarkably safe and dependable means of transportation. In three and a quarter million miles of travel by air, only 15 persons were killed and 43 injured in a total of 27 serious accidents. Most of these accidents occurred among that class of civilian aviators known as gypsy flyers."

"Of the 1,200 commercial aircraft, probably 1,000 are under the indirect supervision of responsible plane manufacturers or transportation companies, and this is absolutely by the only regulation over flying, as local ordinances or state laws can not be enforced. Lacking a federal organization controlling civilian aviation, these 200 or more gypsy flyers have been permitted to fly at will and many have met disaster."

"Eight of the fatalities and 22 of the injuries in the last six months have been traced to the lack of terminals, routes and storm warnings, or to reckless stunting—errors which have been corrected or prevented had there been a national air policy. In all the United States there are only 214 adequate municipal or civilian air ports, yet terminals are necessary to aerial transport as they are to shipping or the railways. Deducting these preventable casualties, it is found that there was only one death for each 464,285 miles flown and only one injury for each 295,454 miles flown."

Special Federal Taxes are Due

Forms for filing returns of special taxes upon business and occupations are now available at offices of collectors of internal revenue and at branch offices. These taxes are due July 1, and are held by the Bureau of Internal Revenue to be delinquent unless paid on or before July 31. The list includes the tax brokers, pawnbrokers, museums, theaters, and concert halls, circuses, bowling alleys, shooting galleries, riding academies and automobiles operated for hire.

When the tax is paid a stamp is issued by the collector of internal revenue, which the person engaged in the business or occupation subject to the tax is required to post conspicuously in his place of business. Failure in this respect renders the offender liable to a penalty equal to the special tax, and the cost of prosecution. In no case is the penalty less than \$10.

The tax on brokers, whose business it is to negotiate for others, purchases or sales of stocks, bonds, exchange, bullion, coined money,

promissory notes or other securities, and produce or merchandise, is \$50 a year. If the broker is a member of a stock exchange, produce exchange, board of trade or similar organization which sells produce or merchandise and the average value during the preceding year ended June 30 of a seat or membership in such organization was \$2,000 and not more than \$5,000 he is required to pay an additional tax of \$100. If such value was more than \$5,000 he is required to pay an additional tax of \$150. Pawnbrokers are subject to a special tax of \$100 a year.

The tax on ship brokers, whose business it is to negotiate freight and other business for the owners of vessels or for consignors or consignees of freight carried by vessels, is \$50 a year.

Customhouse brokers, whose business, as the agent of others, is to prepare entries and other customhouse papers or to transact business at any port of entry relating to the importation or exportation of goods and merchandise, pay a special tax of \$50 a year.

Theaters, museums and concert halls are taxed according to their seating capacity, and the population of the city or town in which they are located. Those having a seating capacity of not more than two hundred and fifty are taxed \$50; seating capacity of more than two hundred and fifty and not exceeding five hundred \$100; exceeding five hundred and not exceeding eight hundred, \$150; in excess of eight hundred, \$200. The tax in cities or towns of 5,000 inhabitants or less is one-half of these amounts. This tax is paid by the proprietor.

The special tax on circuses is \$100. The tax on bowling alleys and billiard rooms is \$10 for each alley or table. Shooting galleries are subject to a tax of \$20. The tax on riding academies is \$100.

Persons carrying on the business of renting or operating passenger automobiles for hire are required to pay a tax of \$10 for each such automobile having a seating capacity of more than two and not more than

seven and \$20 for each such automobile having a seating capacity of more than seven.

Special taxes on manufacturers of tobacco products are due also in July, and on manufacturers and wholesale and retail dealers in oleomargarine, adulterated and renovated butter, filled cheese, and persons engaged in the manufacture of mixed flour.

Returns of the capital stock tax also are required on or before July 31. The capital stock tax applies to every corporation carrying on or doing business in the United States. The tax on domestic corporations is \$1 for each \$1,000 of so much of the fair average value of its capital stock for the preceding year ending June 30 as is in excess of \$5,000. Foreign corporations are required to pay a tax of \$1 for each \$1,000 of the average amount of its capital stock employed in the transaction of its business in the United States during the preceding year ending June 30, without the benefit of the \$5,000 deduction.

Penalties ranging from a fine not to exceed \$1,000 for failure, and not to exceed \$10,000 or one year's imprisonment, or both, for willful refusal to make return and pay the taxes are prescribed by the revenue act.

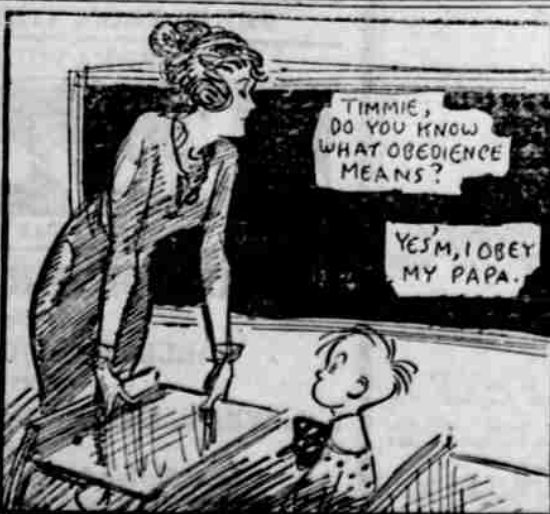
