The Christian team made numerous errors at crucial moments, after having piled up six runs against two put across by the Presbyterians. Aided by these errors and several bunched hits, the Presbies tied the score in the fourth inning and in the fifth put across the run which ended the game.

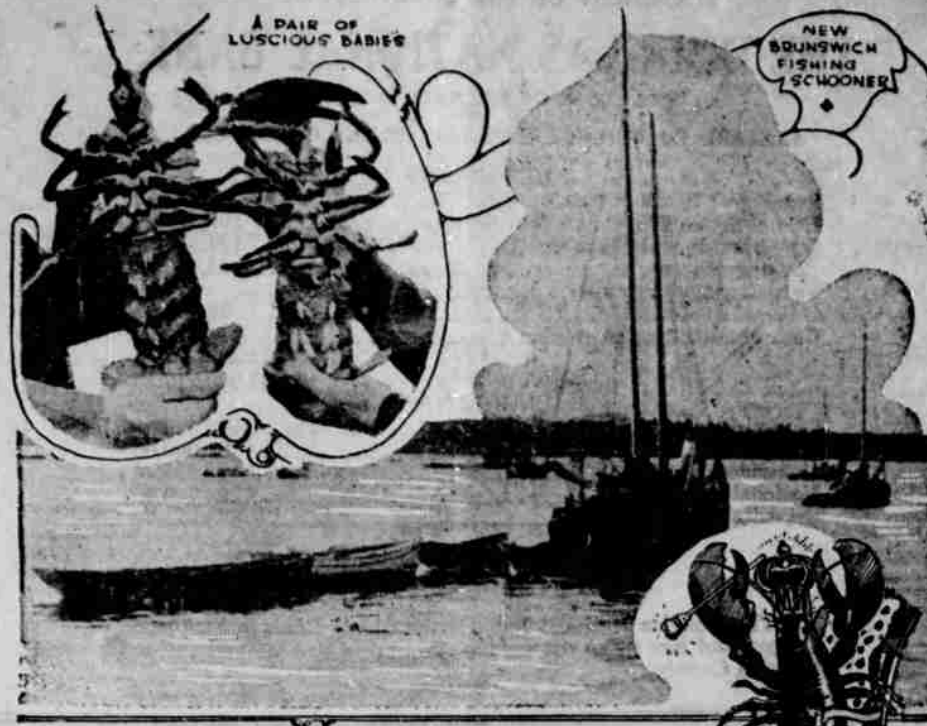
In the last inning, with the score tied, the Presbyterians, batting last, pushed a man around to third, and with two out a passed ball at home plate allowed him to score.

TWO BITS BUYS A FEAST IN MONTREAL



"Baby Lobsters. Cooked to Order."

So reads the advertisement of a popular restaurant in Montreal. Imagine the rush that would ensue should any American restaurateur advertise lobsters at such a figure. How can Canadians furnish this delicacy so cheaply?

Here's the explanation. Canada is the home of the lobster. Ninety per cent of the world's supply of this toothsome edible originates in the waters off Nova Scotia, N. S. Brunswick and Quebec. Such portion as appears in the Canadian market is free of duty charges, hence can be sold more cheaply than in countries to which it is exported. The fishermen at Richibucto, N. B., are catching so many lobsters that they are hard put to it to know what to do with the catch. More than 400 years have passed

since the first Basque and Breton fishermen found lobsters among the fish drawn up by their nets from Chaleur Bay, yet today the same quaint customs, costumes and ideas prevail in that far eastern arm of Quebec province that is held between the south shore of the St. Lawrence River where it empties into the Gulf of St. Lawrence, and the north shore of Chaleur Bay—Chaleur Bay immortalized by the chansons of the north. One of these ideas is that lobsters, clams and oysters are sure-death to him who eats them.

Recently an American writer spent a summer at Percé on Chaleur Bay and relates most amusingly the horror with which the natives greeted his intention of making a supper of clams. Early the next morning several fearsomely approached his house expecting to find a corpse. The house servant remarked, "I've heard that folks

did eat 'em, but I wouldn't believe it ever if I hadn't seen you eat 'em before my own eyes." These people live on a sparse, almost meatless diet, denying themselves these luscious, nutritive foods, through sheer ignorance, the price of Boston beans or New York beef-steaks are sure to appeal to Yankee tourists. Perhaps the fact that the menu card on which Mr. Lobster is listed, carries a win: too, may be a factor in making the province so popular with those traveling for pleasure.
