News of Interest From State Capital

(News-Review Salem Bureau.)

SALEM, Or., July 5.—(Special.)—Upon transfer of the ownership, by sale or otherwise, of motor vehicles, the person in whose name the vehicle is registered and licensed and the person to whom the ownership is to be transferred shall immediately join in a notice of transfer, according to an opinion of Attorney General Van Winkle in reply to an inquiry by Sam A. Koser, secretary of state.

Neal Holloway, who escaped from the state penitentiary May 23, while working as a trustee, was arrested at Payette, Ida., and has been returned to the state prison. George Evans, who escaped at the same time, also a trustee, was returned two weeks ago from Wyoming.

State stationery sent out from the capitol will bear the advertisement: "Oregon will hold a world's fair in 1925."

Miss Juanita Powers of Wallowa, la. winner for Oregon of the essay contest put on by the highway transportation committee at Washington, D. C., and her essay will enter the national contest for a \$5000 scholarship prize, which may be used in any American college or university of her choosing.

Governor Olcott honored a requisition from the governor of Massachusetts for the extradition of Sam Segal who is wanted in Boston on a charge of non-support.

It is unlawful for a pawnbroker to engage in business in Oregon without a license from the state superintendent of banks for which he shall pay \$100, according to an opinion of the attorney general, written in reply to an inquiry by the bank superintendent.

A hospital unit of the Oregon national guard has been organized at Lebanon.

Nearly sixty Oregon industrial concerns that operate under the

workmen's compensation act have elected to take advantage of the reduction in rates available by the establishment of a system of accident prevention. The reduction amounts to 5 per cent.

Two hundred musical works of Oregon composers have been presented to the state library by the Oregon Society of Composers, through Dr. Emil Enna, of Portland, president of the society.

Approximately forty-three gallons of gasoline were used by the average Oregon motorist during the month of May, according to figures of the secretary of state. A total of 4,455,385.5 gallons of gasoline and 183,907 gallons of distillate were used during the month.

Salem banks will advance the state approximately half a million dollars to take care of warrants drawn on the general fund which just now is depleted. State Treasurer Hoff has announced. This will make it unnecessary to endorse the warrants "not paid for want of funds."

J. F. Albright, of Oregon City, has filed with the secretary of state copies of a proposed constitutional amendment which he has initiated and which will be submitted to the voters of the state at the general election in 1922, providing that 7 per cent shall be the maximum legal rate of interest on contracts by express agreement of the parties to the contract.

About 75 per cent of the complaints received by the real estate department of the state insurance commissioner from persons alleging maltreatment at the hands of realtors, are without foundation, declares A. C. Barber, insurance commissioner. However, about \$2000 has been recovered for complainants in the last year.

Water used for irrigation purposes is appurtenant to the land on which it is used and the water rights should be assessed as real estate, according to an opinion of Attorney General Van Winkle, written for the state tax commission.

For the months of April, May and June, Percy A. Cupper, state engineer,

issued 125 permits for the appropriation of water from Oregon streams. These cover the irrigation of 3873 acres, the building of 145 miles of canal, the development of seventy-five horsepower and the total cost will be about \$692,155.

The public service commission has issued an order holding that the American Railway Express company is not entitled to a 20 and 25 per cent rise in express rates on intrastate shipments of buttermilk, condensed milk, cream, milk and ice cream. The company failed to justify the demand at a hearing, the commission holds.

The new world war veterans' state aid commission has unanimously elected Captain Harry C. Brumbaugh of Portland as its executive secretary.

Five fatal accidents out of a total of 358 accidents were reported to the state industrial accident commission for the week ending June 30. They were: George E. Boothby of Carleton, William Skidmore of Curtin, Tom Gabrielson of Bridal Veil, James Kazantz of Knappa, and George McLain of Mt. Angel.

Governor Olcott has reappointed Frank K. Lovell as state tax commissioner. His new term will expire May 21, 1925.

Governor Olcott has reappointed R. E. Bartlett of Astoria, Fred D. Weber of Portland, and Fred Hesse of Portland as members of the state board of engineering examiners. Their terms will expire July 1, 1927.

The reappointment of C. L. Starr of Portland as a member of the board of regents of Oregon normal schools is announced by Governor Olcott.

During the month of June \$90,521.85 was received by G. G. Brown, clerk of the state land board, custodian of school fund notes and mortgages, and turned over to State Treasurer O. P. Hoff.

Progress on new mill.

On the quiet and picturesque Isle of Man, made famous by Hall Caine's fiction, an ancient pump of the chain-bucket variety, built into a masonry abutment on the face of a rock cliff, lifts its endless load of water some eighty feet from the pool below, says Popular Mechanics Magazine. For many years a big steam engine of obsolete form, slow and extravagant of fuel, attended to the duty of turning the chain shaft. But now the old boiler and cylinder are gone, and in their place a modern wind motor has been installed, its slim, efficient steel form rising from the cliff top in striking, yet not unharmonious, contrast with the primitive ruggedness that marks the earlier work of man and nature. The whirling 26-foot wheel of the new motive power now is drawing up 14,900 gallons of water an hour, as an average figure, and it is significant of the value of modern methods that the saving of fuel, no longer needed for a hungry boiler, soon paid the cost of the mill.

Projected Aerial Newspaper.

The last word in journalism is the Aerial Mail, a daily newspaper, which is edited, printed and published from an airplane in flight. The Daily Mail, which is sponsoring it, says it will contain the latest British and continental news, political, financial and general, received both at the moment the airplane "takes off" and while it is flying, the news being sent by wireless. A special printing plant has been installed and newspapers will be distributed by means of parachutes dropping the editions into the towns the airplane flies over.

BRITAIN FREE FROM WOLVES

Country More Fortunate in That Respect Than Are Other Lands in Europe.

We in the British Isles appear to have got rid of the wolf plague. In England, in the early fifteenth century, the beast ceased to be a danger that had to be reckoned with. It remained longer in Scotland, where the very last wolf ever heard of in the roaming state is said to have been slain by Sir Ewen Cameron of Lochiel during the reign of Charles II—an incident that appears to have been looked upon as distinctly worthy of notice. The complete and final elimination of the beast is no doubt owing to the fact that, as lupus was steadily being hunted down in the land, our insular position precluded all possibility of fresh immigration. In France the case was different. There was nothing to prevent the migrating wolf from reaching the country from the wildernesses of Central Europe—even from Russia and still more distant Siberia, the classic home of the race.

Many are the legends, to some extent based on fact, of vast armies of wolves traveling—even as the invading Goths and Vandals—from their hungry deserts to the richer lands of the West, to be stopped only by the Atlantic. At any rate, to this day the black wolf crosses the Pyrenees, and the brown wolf the Alps, to reinforce fraternally the ranks of the much-harried gray wolf of France. And the day seems still far distant when the curse will be finally extinguished—Egerton Castle in the Youth's Companion.
