## NEW MAN ASSIGNED TO UMPQUA VALLEY

Oregon Growers Sending One of Its Best Men Into This District.

HAS HAD EXPERIENCE

Harry White of the Salem District Ordered to Roseburg to Take Charge of Association's Business in This Vicinity.

Mr. Harry White, who has been affiliated with the Oregon Growers Cooperative Association in their activities in the Willamette valley for the past two years, has been delegated to Roseburg to take charge of the affairs of the association in the Umpqua valley. In sending Mr. White to the Umpqua valley the association feels that it is sending one of the best men it has ever had in its employ to the growers there.

Mr. White is a very successful orchardist, operating a farm of his own in the Salem district where he produces apples, pears, cherries and berries. He has had many years of experience in packing and selling fruit and is thoroughly familiar with all phases of handling fresh fruits.

Having at one time been superintendent of a cannery, Mr. White is thoroughly familiar with this phase of the work. He has had two years' experience in barreling berries to be shipped under ice for jam and soda fountain use and is widely experienced in drying prunes, loganberries and cherries. It is stated by C. I. Lewis, assistant general manager of the Oregon Growers Cooperative Association that few men the state of Oregon have had the wide experience of Mr. White in handling fruits.

Mr. White is a good mixer with the growers. Is an aggressive, hard worker, and has the reputation with the organization of putting across everything that he attempts. He will have his headquarters at Roseburg and a little later his family will join him there.

No man in the employ of the association has been more successful in signing up members, in selling preferred stock and in rapid, economical movement of fruit than Mr. White. The Willamette valley members will regret losing him and the members of the Oregon Growers in the Umpqua valley are to be congratulated that Mr. White is to give up his time to their problems.

## Roseburg Party Visits Crater Lake

W. J. Weaver of the Umpqua hotel, accompanied by Mrs. Weaver and the latter's sister, Mrs. Peterson, of Spokane, Wash., and Mr. and Mrs. M. F. Rice, have returned from a trip to Crater Lake, Pelican Bay and Klamath Falls. The party left this city Saturday morning at 9 o'clock, arriving at the lake at 8 o'clock in the evening of the same day, though compelled to walk the last mile and a half of the journey on account of the deep snow on the road which Mr. Weaver states, has now been removed and the roadway is clear for the entire trip. Speaking of the accommodations at Crater Lake, the party recommends them very highly. The hotel, under new management, is up to date in every particular and the menu served is excellent. Many portable houses are being erected for the accommodation of tourists, baths installed and an electric lighting system placed in operation. Mr. Weaver says many visitors are already at the lake and now that the road is open the summer rush will soon be on. The general condition of the roads leading from Gold Hill to Crater Lake are exceptionally good, Mr. Weaver states, evidence of which fact is the quick time made by the Roseburg party in reaching their destination.

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## FOUND ANGLING GOOD SPORT

Many Notables Have Been Devotees of Sport Immortalized by Sir Isaac Walton.

When President Harding prepared himself for the responsibilities of his great office by spending a few weeks fishing in Florida he added one more to the long list of notables who have been devotees of that sport. It is recorded that Noah was not only a good boatman, but a skillful angler as well. Long before the flood, and far away in the mists of time, there is a Babylonian legend that Belus, son of Nimrod, discovered fishing. The first authentic record of angling appears when the Lord asks Job: "Can't thou take out a fish with a hook?" The great Homer immortalizes the art in the "Iliad" and "Odyssey," stating that godlike men, when pinched for dinner fished with crooked hooks, and even dived for oysters. It was Plato, the Greek philosopher, who once said: "There is nothing in angling that is noble, or daring, or requiring skill." Charlemagne, who dominated western Europe in the eighth century, advised his subjects to take up the art of angling in order to be content. "Because," said he, "I have never yet known an angler who was melancholy."

But the greatest fisherman and philosopher of modern times is undoubtedly Sir Isaac Walton. In his "Complete Angler" he indicates the progress of fishing, particularly on turning trout. He had a different colored fly for every month in the year. His books are a source of information for all, and it has been said that in them a child may wade and the tallest giant swim. "Angling," said Isaac, "is like mathematics, in that it can never be fully learned, at least not so fully but that there will always be room for experiment by some succeeding angler."—Detroit News.
