Reedsport Visited By Monster Fire

REEDSPORT, Or., July 6.—Fire which started at 6:20 o'clock tonight, and laid to spontaneous combustion, destroyed the Reedsport planing mill, with a loss of \$50,000, three residences nearby, and for a time threatened to wipe out the whole town of Reedsport.

Efforts of the male populace of Reedsport, supplied with water through a new \$150,000 system recently installed, confined the fire to the planing mill and saved the large sawmills of the Reedsport Lumber company and the Johnson Lumber mill, the plant of the Pacific Fish & Cold Storage company, in addition to large stocks of lumber, railroad cars and other material.

The fire started in the storeroom of the planing mill, where large quantities of planed lumber were piled. A quantity of gasoline is said to have ignited from spontaneous combustion. In two hours the plant was destroyed.

Insurance totaled \$12,000. The plant was owned by H. C. Morris and C. L. Johnson. Two of the residences were owned by workmen and the other by Mr. Johnson.

The large mills threatened constituted almost the entire industrial structure of Reedsport.

TOURIST LOSES MONEY

PATROL PLANE WRECKED.

EUGENE, Or., July 6.—One of the airplanes of the 91st aero squadron of the United States army stationed here this summer on forest fire patrol duty was wrecked completely in the timber 25 miles west of Medford at 2:30 o'clock this afternoon. The pilot, Sergeant Bernard Helman, and the observer, Reed Cain, were shaken up but not badly hurt.

The plane left Eugene this morning at 8 o'clock, reached Medford on the regular trip and started out on the home flight when the motor stopped and the plane landed among the trees.

Hints to Aid Work Horses

CHICAGO, July 7.—Despite the coming of the automobile there are still thirty thousand horses today on the streets of Chicago. Faithful servants they are, whose lives are hard at best, particularly in the very hot weather, observes H. D. Roberts, secretary of the Chicago Anti-Cruelty society. He suggests the following "don'ts" to teamsters here and in other cities.

"Don't drive fast. The few minutes you save may cost you a horse. Don't put on heavy loads.

"Don't let your horse stand in the sun. Even if he has to stand for a few minutes, pick out a shady place if possible to do so.

"Don't fail to water your horse as often as possible. It will not hurt him as he has worked. If you are going to let him stand for a while, only give him a small drink.

"Don't use a horse at all unless it has a canopy top. The ordinary kind is worse than none.

"If you use a sponge cloth, see that it is kept wet. If it is dry it is worse than no protection.

"Don't fail to watch your horse closely. If he gets sick, don't wait. Get him into the shade. Take off his harness and bridle. Wash out his mouth. Sponge him off with cold water. Put cold water or ice on his head, and send for a doctor.

HILTON SPEAKS AT CONVENTION

Local Pastor Is Speaker at State Convention of the Christian Church.

ATTENDANCE IS LARGE

Nationally Known Religious Workers Gather at Turner for Annual Meeting of Membership of Church—Fine Program Is Prepared.

TURNER, Or., July 6.—The largest attendance in many years, a spirit of zealous study, speeches by prominent ministers and Bible leaders of Oregon, and ideal weather are features of the 31st annual convention of the Christian churches of Oregon, which opened here Saturday and will continue until Sunday night.

The Turner lodge and all cottages are filled with ministers and laymen from all over the state, here with their families.

A program has been prepared by the convention officers: Rev. E. V. Stivers of Eugene, president; Rev. J. A. Bennett of Silverton, chairman, and Rev. C. F. Swander of Portland, secretary.

Sermons on Sunday were delivered by Rev. Stivers who spoke on "Our Part in Christ's Program;" Rev. J. J. Evans of Salem, who preached the communion sermon, and Rev. Clarence W. Reynolds of Corvallis, whose subject was "Pray and Pay."

Pastors Deliver Addresses.

A forceful address on "Our Heritage of Freedom" was delivered this morning by Rev. C. H. Hilton of Roseburg. Other addresses of the day were delivered by Rev. Jesse M. Bader, national secretary of educational evangelism, of St. Louis, Mo.; Rev. J. F. Gormley, a pioneer Portland pastor, now of Kern Park, who spoke on "Preachers and Preaching Among Churches of Christ in the Past;" Rev. L. E. Hoskins of Montavilla, Portland, who spoke on "Preachers and Preaching Among Churches of Christ in the Future," and Rev. Ted Godwin of Eugene, a young evangelist.

A schedule similar to a "school of methods" is observed each morning.

Other prominent persons connected with the work of the Christian church in Oregon, in attendance are: Dean E. C. Sanderson, president of Eugene Bible university; Rev. B. M. Conner and Rev. Harold Griffith, Portland; Rev. Peter Burnett of Eugene; Mrs. C. A. Pounay, Mrs. A. L. Brown, Mrs. E. E. Starr and Rev. Ralph L. Putnam, Salem.

National Workers Present.

A group of national workers which arrived from Spokane, included Rev. W. F. Turner, northwest superintendent of missions; Ray K. Roadruck, northwest superintendent of Bible schools; Mrs. Louise Kelly, northwest secretary of the Christian women's board of missions, and Mrs. Clara G. P. O. APPOINTMENTS RUSHED.

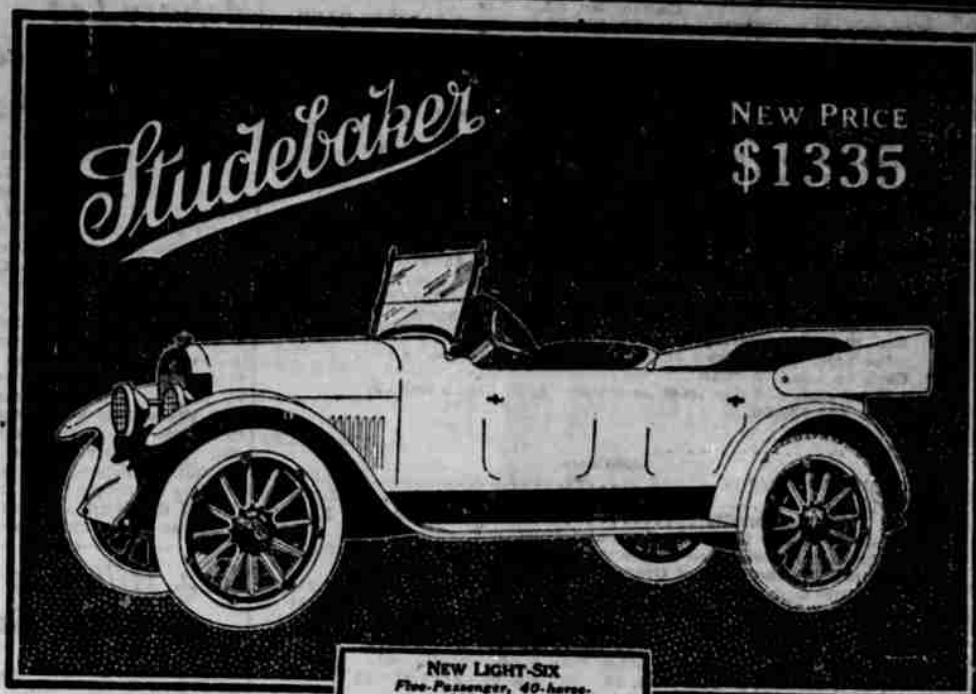
