the boy appeared, Durland took him to one side and they engaged in a confidential conversation.

Clarence Johnson on the stand stated that when Durland called him off to one side he immediately asked him if he (Johnson) had heard anything about him (Durland). He stated that the people had not treated him right; that they appeared to be holding aloof from him for some reason and he asked Johnson if there was anything that he had heard which would cause this. Johnson told him that he had not and asked what would cause such action. Durland replied that he did not know unless it was because he was a member of the Non-Partisan league. Johnson assured him that this would not cause people to shun him and that evidently this aloofness existed only in his imagination. Following the conversation Durland hurried away and came to Roseburg for his family, taking them out for a Fourth of July picnic.

J. R. Durland, the oldest son, who resides at Biggs, Oregon, gave more information regarding the financial standing. There was a mortgage on the farm but it had been taken care of for five years, he stated. His father had plenty of money, he said, and had no reason for worrying over such matters. He testified that he had purchased the rifle and that it was defective in that the extractor was apt to become stuck at any time.

Following his testimony Coroner Ritter made a statement about the finding of the body and the surrounding evidence and the case was placed in the hands of the jury which at once returned its verdict of accidental death.

and shaped immediately, using one tie. If long tan shaped bunch of clover is desired, then weave together with a twine, then catch a few of each succeeding layers through the back and the ends of all tightly. Care heads down from rack. Should they start to heat, separate slightly by using pieces of shingle so air can circulate through, but remove these shingles before they reach cures. If room is kept dark both clover and vetch will retain color. Do not store but leave on curing rack until wanted, then wrap carefully in paper, just slightly moist but not wet and pack.

McNary Led Fight to Keep Senate at Work

(News-Review Washington Bureau.)

WASHINGTON, July 7.—Senator McNary led the fight to prevent the senate from recessing for practically a month. He and Senator New are of the opinion that there should be continuous sessions until some of the legislation pledged by the party is finished.

Senator McNary rounded up a lot of Western recruits, and members of the agricultural block and the Lodge resolution to adjourn was defeated, 17 to 24. The prospects are now that the senate will remain in session, and put through some legislation immediately, rather than wait till fall. The real plan of the leaders was to recess for a month, and then if the tariff bill was not ready to recess until September 1.

Rev. Hilton to be In Pulpit Sunday

Word was received this morning from Rev. C. H. Hilton, pastor of the local Christian church, to the effect that he will return to Roseburg Saturday night and will occupy his pulpit Sunday. Rev. Hilton is now at Turner attending the annual state convention of the Christian church and had expected to remain in Turner for two or more weeks, but unexpected business has resulted in his being called home over Sunday. He will preach Sunday morning and will probably return to Turner Sunday night or Monday morning to remain for the rest of the convention. He states that the convention is one of the best ever held by the Christian church and the program is exceptionally good.

Road Petition Is Filed Today

The petitions asking the county court for the construction of a road along the west side of the South Umpqua river from Oak street to connect with the county road in Umpqua Park was filed with the county court today. The petition was presented by Mrs. A. J. Davis, but may be traced down because of faulty posting of notices. One notice was posted at the court house, another at Judd's barn, a third on the west end of the Oak street bridge, and a fourth near the West Side store. The law prescribes that they must be posted in the immediate vicinity of the road, which the petition declares was done. The matter has been submitted to the district attorney to determine whether or not the notices were legally posted and whether or not the petition will stand.

FOREST FIRE REPORTED.

A small forest fire on the north slope of Abbott Butte was reported today by forest observers. The Butte is on the divide between the Umpqua and Crater forests. It is only a small blaze and it is thought that it will be easily controlled. Two experienced men have been sent to the scene of the fire. Forest Supervisor Ramsdell states.

COMPLETING BRIDGE.

Deputy Forest Supervisor George Bonebrake who has been superintending the repairs to the North Umpqua suspension bridge, states that the work has been almost completed and that the task will be finished next week. The old towers have been replaced and all needed repairs made.

TARIFF WILL HELP START SHINGLE MILLS. (News-Review Washington Bureau.)

WASHINGTON, July 6.—Chairman Fordney, of the house ways and means committee, in announcing a majority report on the tariff bill to the house, stated that protective rates were imposed on shingles to allow shingle mills of the northwest to resume operations without fear of Canadian competition.

He also declared that retaliatory duties on lumber were required to protect northwestern manufacturers.

Mr. Fordney stated that the baring tariff will undoubtedly exercise a beneficial effect on American export trade in lumber.

"Paragraph 468," he said, "imposes a duty of 50 cents a thousand on shingles. Shingles are now admitted free of duty, and American shingle mills in the Northwest as a result have been forced to suspend operations."

"The shingle industry is one of

magnitude, and the adverse effect of the existing law is working a hardship on those who depend for their livelihood on the shingle industry. The rate on shingles recommended by the committee is very moderate, but it is hoped by the committee that it will result in resumption of operations in domestic shingle mills."

NATURE FOND OF FREAKS

Good Old Dame Seems to Take Pride in Perpetuating Physical Oddities in Mankind.

Occasionally it happens that a boy or girl is born with webbed feet—that is to say, with toes united by fleshy tissues. It is a phenomenon called "syndactyly."

This eccentricity is apt to be handed down from generation to generation in a family, appearing in some of its members, but not in others.

The Magazine of Heredity describes one such case, in a branch of an old New England family. The paternal grandfather was web-footed and bequeathed his peculiar toes to a son, who passed them along to three of his six children.

If these people were to intermarry for three or four generations with another web-footed family, all the children born would exhibit the peculiarity. For nature, curiously enough, seems always willing to perpetuate freaks of any kind.

What we call freaks, or "sports," in the animal or the vegetable world are nature's little experiments. It is by this means that she creates new species and varieties. Some anthropologists are of opinion that all human beings were originally black and that the first white man was a sport.

WRITER MUST HAVE STYLE

Without It, Declares Arnold Bennett, He Will Be Unable to Get His Message Understood.

You cannot have good matter with bad style. Examine the point more closely. A man wishes to convey a line idea to you. He employs a form of words. That form of words is his style. Having read, you say: "Yes, this idea is fine." The writer has therefore achieved his end. But in what imaginable circumstances can you say, "Yes, this idea is fine, but the style is not fine?" The sole medium of communication between you and the author has been the form of words. The fine idea has reached you. Hence the fitness must be in the words. You may say, superiorly: "He has expressed himself clumsily, but I can see what he means." By what light? Is something in the words, in the style. That something is fine. Moreover, if the style is clumsy, are you sure that you can see what he means? You cannot be quite sure. And at any rate, you cannot see distinctly. The "medium" is what actually reaches you, and it must necessarily be affected by the style.—Arnold Bennett.
