WOMEN IN THE BUSINESS WORLD.

It is rather singular that retail trade has been so nearly monopolized by men. Women have done most of the household purchasing, and are skillful bargainers. They have those graces and courtesies that are so useful to a seller of any product. In school they manifest accuracy, so they have the qualifications for success as owners of stores. Yet up to a few years ago, comparatively few entered this field. Many women have done well in the millinery trade, and in specialties of women's wear. In taking up other lines, they are perhaps handicapped by the conservatism of bankers who may have doubts about extending credit to a woman merchant. Women have taken up enterprises that could be carried on in their homes or in a part of their time, and which thus were suited to the obligations of those having families. In this way they have run gift shops, have conducted ice cream and soft drink places, have supplied toilet articles, neckwear, candle shades, embroidery, and artistic rugs and baskets, artificial flowers, and hundreds of other pleasing products. The trouble with most of these enterprises is, that they do not supply basic essentials. When business is dull or times hard, such projects go on the rocks. A bakery to supply cooked food, or a boarding house to serve meals, would be a better source of income. As women gain confidence in their own powers, as business men see what women can do and are more willing to trust them with capital, it seems inevitable that many of them should become successful merchandisers. Many of the bright girls now in Roseburg will probably in 20 years be taking a conspicuous position in our business life.

There are many signs now on the horizon that folks are getting back to normal, says a county agent writing for Farm Life. We have just had our house remodeled a little and two carpenters, a father and son, did the work. The way they would work was a caution and it surely was refreshing to have men work whether or not the boss was around; working to get the job done rather than for Saturday night and the pay envelope. Such a sight has been so uncommon during the last three or four years that the specie of employe willing to give an honest day's work for a day's pay has become almost extinct. You know, these last three or four years have spoiled a lot of young fellows and one can see this on every hand. Work was so plentiful and men so few that it got the younger generation to thinking that the old law of the survival of the fittest had ceased to operate. Now, however, these same young men are finding that the fellow who tried to be the first to make his getaway as soon as the whistle blew was the first to be made to get away when business slackened off. Bothe teams failed to score in the second inning and the score was tied in the third.

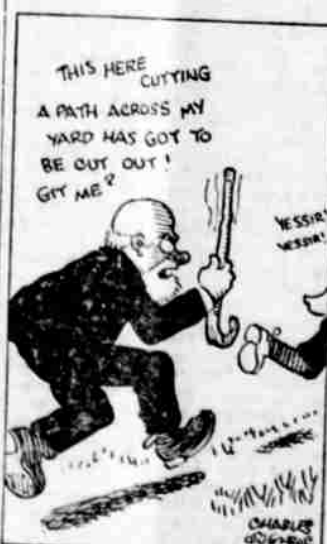

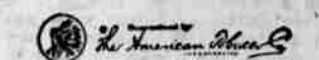
