Both Parties Aid in Holding Up Bonus Bill

(News-Review Washington Bureau.) WASHINGTON, July 9.—Enough votes are in sight now to enable the senate leaders to recommit to the finance committee of the senate the soldiers' bonus bill, as requested by President Harding in his visit to the capitol Thursday. A careful pool has been taken by the friends of the administration plan and the count of noses is that the administration can depend upon twelve democratic votes and two-thirds of the entire republican membership to follow the lead of President Harding.

The test vote on the question will not come before Monday and will follow the receipt of the special message of the president on this subject, which, it is now planned, will be before the senate not later than Monday. The president is giving this message a great deal of attention and is as yet undecided as to whether he will deliver the message in person or send it in writing. He told his friends today that if there was any doubt as to the significance of his expression he would deliver it to the senate himself and give the instrument his own individual interpretation, so there could be no mistake as to his intention or desire.

Oppose Adjournment. While the administration leaders in the senate are confident that they can recommit the bonus bill to the finance committee to be held there until the tax laws have been revised and the treasury can make its complete estimates based upon the new revenue laws, there are not enough votes in sight to permit the recess or adjournments of the senate for any period of time.

Senator Borah is determined that there shall be no recess or adjournment of the senate until he has secured the passage of the bill for free tolls in the Panama canal for coastwise shipping which he has proposed favorably to the senate and which he is determined shall become a law before the special session ends.

It seems evident that there is a strong movement on foot in the senate to lay aside the tariff after it reaches the senate to give the tax revision legislation the right of way.

Plans Discussion. Senator Watson, of Indiana, one of the leading members of the senate finance committee, is active in securing this result. His plan is to have a desultory discussion of the tariff in the senate after it comes out of the finance committee and as soon as the tax bill comes from the house to sidetrack the tariff and make the revision of the unfinished business of the senate. This plan is justified in his opinion by the national demand for new tax laws and readjustment of the present federal tax burdens as well as the many differences of opinion already generated by the tariff bill and the possibility of a deadlock on the tariff which may carry this struggle into the regular session of congress which convenes next December.

Many of the republican leaders doubt the early passage of any tariff bill and desire to get the tax bill out in front so that it may become a law before the special session ends and all business men may plan for the new tax requirements.
