Wages Decreasing Reports Show

SALEM, Ore., July 14.—Licensed employment offices in Oregon, for the first six months of the year 1921, placed in positions a total of 20,282 persons, as against 52,969 persons in the period in the year 1920, according to a report prepared by C. H. Gram, state labor commissioner.

The report also shows that wages have decreased materially the past year, and carpenters who in the year 1920, were receiving \$7.14 a day are now being paid \$6.18 a day. A similar reduction is noticeable in all other professions covered in the report. The comparisons of wages is based on averages, and does not apply to compensation received by the workers in any particular section of the state.

Large Sum Money Comes to University

EUGENE, July 14.—More than \$225,000 becomes available for the University of Oregon medical department as the result of a check for \$113,269.50, which was received from the Rockefeller Education board yesterday.

A similar sum immediately becomes available from the state. According to University officials the contract for the new building at Portland will be let at once. Upon the completion of a five building another \$50,000 will be forwarded by the board, it is said.

The Rockefeller Education board was organized in 1902.

The check was found in the president's mail by his stenographer yesterday afternoon while running through the routine correspondence of the day. A short letter, ending with the simple comment "check enclosed," accompanied the draft. Nothing on the outside of the envelope indicated the value of its contents.

In addition to the gift of \$113,269.50 the board has promised \$50,000 more as soon as the building is completed. This money will be for maintenance and research purposes.

FUNERAL HELD TODAY

The funeral of the late Earl Napier, was held this afternoon at the parlors, at 3:30, with Rev. C. H. Hilton officiating. The body will be held here until tomorrow morning, when it will be shipped to Eugene, where interment will follow.

Change Deschutes National Forest

(News-Review Washington Bureau.) WASHINGTON, July 14.—Congressman Sinnott has introduced a bill changing the boundaries of the Deschutes national forest which has been agreed to by the forest service of the United States.

This bill will include several thousand acres of the deforested land on the edges of the national reservation and will permit the forest service to carry on the work of reforestation and remove the fringe of cut-over lands which are unsightly and which could not be redeemed by private enterprise.

Provisions of Bill. The bill provides among other things, "that the secretary of the interior be, and hereby, is, authorized to accept on behalf of the United States title to any lands in private ownership within five miles of the exterior boundaries of the Deschutes national forest which, in the opinion of the secretary of agriculture are chiefly valuable for national forest purposes and, in exchange therefor, may issue patent for an equal value of national forest land, or the secretary of agriculture may permit the grantor to cut and remove an equal value of timber from any national forest in the state of Oregon, the values in each instance to be determined by the secretary of agriculture and be acceptable to the owner as fair compensation, considering

any reservations of timber, of mineral rights or easements made by either party to the exchange.

Timber May Be Cut

Timber given in such exchanges shall be cut and removed under the direction and supervision and in accordance with the requirements of the secretary of agriculture.

"Lands conveyed to the United States under this act shall, upon acceptance of title, become parts of the Deschutes national forest."

Recommittal Bonus Bill Deemed Certain

WASHINGTON, July 13.—An agreement for a vote Friday at 3 o'clock on the motion to recommit the soldiers' bonus bill was reached by the senate late today by unanimous consent.

The result of the vote, leaders of both factions agreed, was not in doubt. Recommittal, as requested by President Harding, is deemed certain.

Senator Lodge of Massachusetts, republican leader, secured the agreement at the close of another day's assault by democratic senators. He said the recommittal motion was in the way of other important measures such as the anti-beer and maternity bills. In agreeing to a vote, however, democrats gave notice that they would not only oppose the republican motion, but would seek to instruct the finance committee to report the bill back at an early date.

Senator Watson, of Georgia, and Hefflin, of Alabama, led the democratic attack today on the motion to recommit. Senator Myers, democrat, Montana, however, advocated recommitment.

That President Harding had exceeded his constitutional limitations in asking the senate to postpone consideration of the bill was asserted by Senator Watson. The republican move, he said, was to send the bill "to a chloroform committee presided over by a chloroform senate."

That the republicans proposed "putting the bill to sleep forever" was asserted also by Senator Hefflin. Senator Hefflin charged that big money interests had contributed to election of a republican president and congress and now were saying "deliver the goods." The same interests, he said, were threatening to cause a panic if the bill should be passed. He contended the treasury was amply able to bear the burden of the bill.

Senator McCumber, republican of North Dakota, who caused the bill to be placed before the senate on behalf of the finance committee, today conferred with President Harding.

SHOCKED ZION, IS FINED \$5.

ZION, Ill., July 13.—Mrs. Sarah Johnson was fined \$5 and costs yesterday for violation of the town's dress ordinance. She was charged with the collar bone and the shoulder of the pit of the neck with the collar bone and the shoulder of the neck to the shoulder tip, with exposing the arms above the middle of the forearm and with wearing a "peek-a-bow" or mosquito net blouse.

Mrs. Johnson on the witness stand contended it was a pink corset cover that officers saw through her waist and offered to go home and get it. City Attorney Theodore Forby complained that peek-a-bow blouses have a tendency to make men curious and are conducive to low public morals. "Women ride through this town in automobiles with not enough clothes on to fill a quill toothpick," he asserted.

"What's in a Name?"

Facts about your name; its history; meaning; whence it was derived; significance; your lucky day and lucky jewel.

ALICIA.

THIS name is derived from the same root as Alice, and represents an attempt at greater euphony. The curious part of it is that the name, in its original form, is really not that of a woman at all, but of a man. It is derived from the Anglo-Saxon Adelgis of which the feminine form was Adelgisa, but was not frequently given to women. Instead it was sacred to the sons of the house, principally among the nobility. The name itself means noble, in both its masculine and feminine forms.

The name is purely English, having, however, a slight Teutonic flavor. An argument is put forward by some experts that the name is derived from the Frankish Adalbert on Adelchen, meaning "daughter." Alia or Alisa in Lombardy was naturalized in England when Alia in Belle married Henry I.

The name, originally masculine, according to the best authorities, however, represents Adelgis and not Adelgisa, making the proper feminine form Aliza. Some believe that Eliza, generally believed to be a derivative of Elizabeth is this missing form. For proof of Aliza as the representative of Adelgisa, the Liber Vitae of Durham records the changes in Adelgisa from the first noble lady of that name, who laid her gifts upon the altar. By contraction it became Adeliza and Aliza.

The talismanic stone of Alicia is the Alexandrite, a Russian gem. It is found in the emerald mines of that nation, being of a beautiful green shade which changes to columbine red. The Russians believe it brings great good fortune. When the subject of its favorite's dream it signifies hope. Monday is Alicia's lucky day and seven her lucky number. Her flower is the white hawthorne, a beautiful bud.

BEAUTY AND THE BEE

WINNIPEG, MAN.—Wild flowers of Manitoba and the blooms of clover and alfalfa put a sum estimated at close to half a million dollars into the pockets of the farmers of the province in 1920. This transmutation of blossoms into gold was accomplished through the agency of bees.

There were 921 beekeepers in the province at the close of the year, according to a government report, and they marketed more than

1,000,000 pounds of honey which sold for 35 and 40 cents a pound. Manitoba has long been the great honey producing province of the Dominion. There are a number of large apiaries whose management is the sole business of their owners but the bulk of the honey comes from the small farmers. Bees are becoming an increasingly important factor in farm industry not only in Manitoba but throughout Western Canada. Their value is being more and more appreciated and in the diversified farming regions along the Canadian National Railways most new settlers add to their income with a few colonies of bees.

Manitoba honey is rated in the market as of superior quality. Every stretch of "old land, whether prairie or wooded, is carpeted all summer with a gorgeous profusion of wild blossoms, while alfalfa and clover spread a flowery banquet for the bees. The rich gold and pure sir, it is said, have much to do with imparting to Manitoba honey its excellent flavor. George Malcolm, minister of agriculture, said recently that honey eventually will be to Manitoba what maple syrup is to Ontario.

Care Taken In Routing Travel

The following letter concerning the routing of travel over fresh pavement and by way of detour roads, was received by the News-Review today from G. E. Farsworth of the state highway department.

Mr. Farsworth says: "Owing to the fact that there seems to be a misunderstanding in regard to traffic on the Pacific highway between Sutherlin and Roseburg, I would like to ask your cooperation in helping to serve the traveling public and more especially in our effort to give them the very best job possible in building permanent highways."

"I have put up more signs along the detour via Garden Valley and hope their will be no confusion with strangers trying to follow the road. Should any complaint reach you, I would be pleased to know, if possible, just where they get off the main road and will attempt to remedy the trouble."

"It is even more important that it be understood by local people, as well as by strangers, that we cannot allow any traffic over the newly laid pavement before 9 o'clock at night, and that we have placed a watchman on the work with strict orders to permit no one to pass over it before that time. This is made necessary by the fact that, although the laying of 'hot stuff' is over at 5 o'clock, it is long after that, especially in this hot weather, before the rollers have finished with it. Furthermore, a number of cars passing over it before it cools are very apt to leave furrows or ridges, which remain there for all time."

TO TIGHTEN LOOSE VIBRATOR

When Screws Holding Brass Jackets Become Worn It Is Good Plan to Use Metal Band.

In case the screws that hold the small brass jackets to the vibrator box become worn so that they do not grip any more, do not try to remedy the trouble by using longer screws, as this will probably injure the windings of the coil and ruin the vibrator. The better plan is to put a metal band clear around the box and attach it to the dash with small bolts.
