Apple Packing Plant To Grow

The packing plant at Garden Valley is to be enlarged to practically twice its present size. Harry White, manager of the local Oregon Growers concern states. The building will be increased in size and a large loading and storage platform constructed. The additions will be made in such a form that future enlargements will be possible. The capacity will be more than doubled but even with the addition it is feared that it will not be of sufficient size to accommodate all of the large crop which is coming on. It is roughly estimated that over 100,000 boxes of apples will be shipped out of the Umpqua Valley this summer and fall, and that the Garden Valley crop will be more than twice as much as last year.
