streets, asking that the street be paved. As the majority of property on this street is owned by the Cobb Real Estate company and the Lexington Investment company, a majority of the property owners were not represented. As Mayor Hamilton is a stockholder in each of these concerns he agreed to take the matter up with the companies and find what action it is desired to be taken.

An order was adopted approving the plans and specifications for the paving of Fowler street and instructing the city recorder to file notice of intention to improve.

It was reported that the hydrant had been installed at the lower end of Mill street but that it is below the street level. This will be investigated to see if the installation was made according to the city's specifications.

Mayor Hamilton reported that extra men had been employed to make repairs on the streets as considerable work is to be done and the street department did not have enough employees to keep the streets clean and do the repair work. The repairs being made were approved by the city council and the men commended for their work.

A neighborhood sewer located in Flint Addition, was discussed. The sewer goes through D. J. Stewart's property and as he desires to move and alter his house the sewer is in his way, and he has asked the council to form a sewer district and have the sewer moved.

As it is strictly a neighborhood proposition the city is unable to take any action at this time, but the matter has been referred to the health and police committee for further investigation.

It was reported that the light on Cobb street, ordered some time ago, has not been installed as yet. Recorder Whipple reported that he had served personal notice on the water and light company to install this light but that no action had been taken.

A bill of \$49.50 for boulders used on the South Stephens street road was allowed. The warrant to be paid to A. S. Wallace. The bill of Ellis Miller for installation of electrical wiring at the camp grounds was also allowed.

Considerable discussion was held regarding the badly breaking pavement in several sections of the city, and the mayor will investigate the cost of making repairs while the highway paving plant is located at Shady Point. An investigation will also be made regarding the paving of the connecting strip between the city limits and the pavement on South Stephens street.

An ordinance for the construction of a sewer in Laurelhurst addition was read first and second time.

That the cost of paving is dropping materially was shown in the estimate for the paving of Fowler street. The estimate in 1920 was \$4136.95, and this year is \$3458.99.
