Above all means don't let our thoughts and spirit in the upbuilding of the community become 'short-circuited.' That's what is the matter with the most of us. Too many of us lack the strength to peck the egg shell of opportunity which will give us life. We even tack the wisdom of the grub to gnaw the chrysalis and emerge with gilded wings into the sunshine of opportunity. Too many of us are static and not enough of us are dynamic in our pent up energies. Too many of us need an agitator to keep our force putsating along the wires of service. A jump spark is all right in a gasoline engine, and that's about the only place it amounts to much.

What Roseburg needs most of all is constancy and consistency, and it wants it right now until it hurts. It would be far better to ground your main idea and free yourself entirely from its influence ,than to have the wires of your brain cross-circuited with the danger of burning out the whole system.

So, with this idea in mind, let's put into concrete shape each and every project planned for the advancement of Roseburg, and shoulder to shoulder, never faltering, work body and soul for the successful and permanent building of the many needed advantages outlined at last evening's gathering of Chamber of Com merce members.

#### AS VIEWED FROM ABROAD.

"No mystery in the criminal annals of Oregon approximate: that at Roseburg," remarks the Portland Journal.

"It was a happening without a parallel. No plot in other homicides has been like it. It is entirely in the domain of crime That there was murder accomplished with firearms is about the only uncontroverted point in the testimony. After hearing the evidence the coroner's jury returned a verdict that the body was that of Russell. This conclusion from a mass of controverted tes timony, but in which, as the verdict indicates, the more convincing proof must have been on the side of the theory that Russell was the victim of the gunshots.

"All the evidence is circumstantial. Frightful mistakes have sometimes been made by too great a reliance on purely circumstantial evidence. Some years ago in France the remnant of a man was liberated from prison on the confession of a real criminal, who, in a deathbed statement, admitted that he had commit ted the murder for which the other man had been convicted. The prisoner had grown old serving on a life sentence through conviction on circumstantial evidence of a crime which he had not

"In the Roseburg case the coroner's jury seems not to have to cared to go so far as to name any one as the murderer. Unless some other mute but more convincing evidence can be assembled. the coroner's verdict will be the formal and official statement of the case until, if ever, one of the supposed principals is found. dead or alive. Until then the case will constitute one of the pre mier murder mysteries in the history of the west.

"Meanwhile it is not difficult to realize the diverging lines of public sentiment, and the wide diversion of opinion in the attractive little city of Roseburg. The flying rumors, the unconfirmed reports and the general interest caused by so unusual tragedy naturally created a public state of mind that will be slow to disappear."

After all has been said and done, few places in Oregon equa Roseburg and the Umpqua Valley. They are just about as near to heaven as some of us will ever get. So be happy in the thought that you live in this neck of the woods,

# Salaries School Teachers Receive

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, July 22.—(Special.)—Although there are approximately 6000 public school leachers in the state of Oregon, only 30 of them receive annual salaries of three thousand dollars or more, ac-ording to figures brought out dur-ing the summer term of the University of Oregon. There are 24 teaching positions carrying salaries between twenty-five hundred and three thousand dellars a year. School room jobs throughout the state with room jobs throughout the state with a compensation rauging between two thousand dollars and twenty-five handred dollars a year number only 240. These figures include Port-land. All the rest of the thousands of teachers, including hundreds of unperintendents, principals, and su-nervisors receive less the thousand dollars a year for their services, though large numbers of hem have spent years in a univer-

sity, college or normal school.

Several superintendents in attendance at the University summer term from the larger towns of the state enort difficulty in completing their taffs for next year. There is still shortage of teachers, they say. The number of calls coming in to the ap-pointment bureau of the university further confirms this report

While 50 per cent of those receiv While 50 per cent of those receiving the top-notch salaries of three housand dollars or more are graduates or former students of the University of Oregon, their compensation does not equal that of alumniof the university who have spent a like number of years in other professions.
