ADVICE TO LOVELORN AND OTHERS

Dear Mrs. Ellabury:—Like lots of others, I am writing to you for advice and I will be very glad if you can help me. I am a young girl 17 years old and a few months ago I had the measles. After that my hair came out for a long time in large clumps at one combing. I have been taking good care of it lately and it doesn't come out any more, but still it is so thin I cannot do anything with it. There are little short hairs coming all over my head but they are not long enough yet to make it look any thicker, only a little bit on top. Do you think it would benefit it any to bob it? My hair is very straight and looks terrible.

WORRIED, Oakland.

A. Yes, it would undoubtedly benefit your hair to bob it, but if it is thin and not curly it will not look at all well for some time. Owing to this fact you will probably curl it, and if you do this, you may as well not bob your hair at all because it will injure the growth. Now that your hair has stopped coming out and is beginning to grow again, I don't believe I would bob it. Trim it up short, cut off two or three inches, leaving it just to your shoulders, with ends long enough to tuck in at the back. This will serve the same purpose as to bob it, and I am sure you will like it better. It will probably be two full years before your hair is the same as before you had the fever, and it may never be the same, but constant care will thicken it, and thick hair is always pretty. Wash it frequently. Clean hair grows, but dirty, oily hair does not. Every night brush it for five or ten minutes, and then with the balls of the fingers massage the scalp briskly. If you care to, you might go to a barber and have him shampoo your hair for you, using a good tonic. If you care to, and will send me a stamped self-addressed envelope, I will give you the name of a good preparation especially adapted to the growth of hair after fever, and also a preparation in which to wash your hair that will make even thin hair look pretty.

No Imaginable Adverse Circumstance Can Keep "Cucuboro" From His Fit of Laughter.

The real Pollyanna of the feathered tribes has just arrived at the bird house in Central park, for if any one can bear up under the name of Cucuboro and still keep cheerful, it shows one of those persistently gay natures that nothing can mitigate.
