Veterans Raise Lowered Flag

PORTLAND, July 29.—Resentment pitched to the fighting point at the sight of the American flag at half-mast over the Portland Social Turn Verein in tribute to J. Henry Albers caused 50 veterans to force their way into the building early yesterday and insist that the emblem be elevated. Alfred Eymes, janitor of the building, and other attendants protested, but protests were of no avail. The veterans did not leave until Eymes had pulled the flag to the top of the pole.

One veteran spotted the flag at half-mast early in the morning. He inquired the reason and was told that it was so placed as a tribute to Henry Albers, whose death occurred Tuesday. The news soon spread around, and other veterans joined the original protest group until a group of 50 descended upon the place.

"I tried to tell them that I had been ordered by Henry Hanno to place the flag at half-mast but they would not listen," said Eymes shortly after the occurrence. "Three of the men were armed and threatened me if I did not obey them, so I could do nothing but pull up the flag. Hanno ordered me to place the flag at half-mast in honor of Henry Albers."

When notified of the occurrence officers of Portland Post No. 1, of the American Legion, asked that it be made plain that their organization was in no way connected with the activities of the men who raised the flag.

"We are in no way concerned or interested in Henry Albers," said Henry Boyd, post commander. "Some of the members of the post might have participated in the raising of the flag, but if they did it was without our knowledge. The legion cannot be held responsible for the actions of its members."

"I would like to know what kind of Americanism it is that permits men to do such stunts as that of this morning," said Henry Hanno, secretary of the Portland Social Turn Verein. "Henry Albers was a member of our organization. He never attended meetings, but he contributed to our support and out of respect to his memory we lowered the flag at half-mast. I ordered the flag taken down entirely when I arrived on the scene."

It was said that the men who led the attack on the Turn Verein were: W. F. Bent, commander of the Disabled Veterans' association; A. S. Pollard of the Disabled Veterans' association and V. H. Cox, a member of the American Legion.

A. I think you are exactly right, and my advice to you is to get married. It is not easy to work and keep house, but to my mind it is much easier than putting off your wedding for two or three years when

Dear Mrs. Ellsbury: Will you tell me how the girls get those waves in their hair. I know they can be married in but that is so expensive and I know they do not all have it done that way. YOUNG GIRL, Roseburg.

A. It can be done nearly as well right at home with an ordinary electric curling iron, or even one that you heat in a lamp. The trick is in the placing of the iron in the hair. Do not twist your hair around the iron. Use the clamp on the iron and after combing your hair straight back insert the iron in your hair lengthwise, which is the way you want the wave to run. Insert it loosely, and twist it just once so as to hold the hair firm. When the iron is pulled out after the usual length of time you will find a lengthwise ripple in your hair.

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, July 29.—Plans are already being made for the fifth annual convention of the national home economics association which will bring specialists from all parts of the country to Corvallis July 3 to 8, 1922. Miss Helen Lee Davis, professor of household arts at the college, has been chosen chairman of the program committee.

Miss Zelta Felke, a 1919 graduate of the college, and secretary of the school of home economics for the last two years, has been appointed secretary of the alumnal association. She will get out a magazine for the interest of the alumnal, and will maintain a directory giving the addresses and occupations of the college graduates.

Federal board rehabilitation men at the college taking courses in animal husbandry and vegetable gardening are now holding various positions on stock breeding farms, truck gardens, diversified farms, and are doing agricultural teaching for the summer.

More than 100 hats of various styles made by students in millinery classes under Miss Helen McPaul, were shown this week at the college, attracting much attention. The hats represented the work of a class of 31 summer session students.

Tom P. Brockway of Portland, a graduate of Reed college last spring, has been appointed instructor in English at the college.

J. C. Ellis, of Huntington, Ind., has been appointed instructor in mechanical drawing. He is a graduate of Purdue university in mechanical engineering.
