Oregon Sidelights

(News-Review Salem Bureau.)
SALEM, Aug. 3. — (Special.)—At a conference of state traffic officers here a decision was reached to enforce thoroughly all the state road laws. Secretary of State Kozar and T. A. Rafferty, chief of the traffic inspectors, addressed the meeting.

Miss Violet Weiborn stenographer for Governor Olcott; Miss Agnes Hayne, clerk in the state corporation department; Mildred Trindle, a teacher of Salem; Mabel Savage, a stenographer in the office of H. S. Gile & Co., and Mrs. Ethel Ottling, stenographer in the state corporation department, left Friday for a trip to Alaska. They will sail from Seattle on the steamer Spokane.

J. E. Calavan, industrial field worker for the state department of education, has returned from a tour in Washington, Clatsop, Yamhill and Columbia counties where he investigated boys' and girls' club work. He says good work is being done in sewing, cooking, poultry pig and calf raising at Waluki, Fernhill, Vesper, Brownmead, Lewis and Clark Knapp and Silvindale and other communities.

Members of the state supreme court began their vacations Saturday. To clear the court preparatory for the month's vacation the court departed from the usual custom and handed down opinions on a day other than Tuesday. Nine were handed down Saturday.

Willard Marks of Albany, A. T. Parrish of Sodaville and M. D. Shanks of Albany have been appointed by Governor Olcott as a commission to investigate relative to the improvement of soda springs and grounds in Linn county. An appropriation of \$800 for the purpose was made by the 1921 legislature.

Warrants passing through the office of the secretary of state for the month of June aggregated \$2,252,322.40, according to Secretary Kozar. Of this amount \$93,524.17 was issued in a single day.

The Shell Oil company of California has remitted to the secretary of state \$5,022.67 in taxes on sales of gasoline and distillate in Oregon for the month of June.

Through a clever ruse perpetrated on penitentiary guards last Tuesday, Frank Payne, a convict, escaped. He was captured, however, the following night. Payne forged the name of Deputy Warden Jim Lewis to a letter transferring him from the brickyard to the highway keeper, and once outside Payne ran away. Payne was sent up from Multnomah county September, 1920, for assault with intent to rob.

Governor Olcott has declined to accept an invitation from William Hale Thompson, mayor of Chicago, to attend the Pageant of Progress exposition now being held in that city.

Percy A. Copper, state engineer, has been on a tour of the Deschutes project with federal reclamation officials.

The Nehalem Boom company has been granted authority of the public service commission to construct an overhead crossing for an industry spur track over a county road near St. Helens and over the tracks of the Spokane, Portland & Seattle road.

The public service commission has granted to the Grand Ronde Railroad company authority to construct and maintain for three months a crossing at grade over the main highway from McMinnville to Tillamook.

An electric passenger elevator is to replace the obsolete hydraulic elevator in the state capital and an electric freight elevator will be installed in the state supreme court building. Bids probably will be opened Aug. 15.

According to a report filed by G. B. Lamb, county school superintendent for Tillamook county, with State Superintendent J. A. Churchill, eight routes for the transportation of pupils to and from schools are in operation in that county during the school year. The cost during the last year was \$8184, or an average of \$1023 for each route. Five teachers' cottages in the county are not credited with much success, but twenty-one play sheds in connection with rural schools have been successful.

Governor Olcott issued a requisition for the extradition of E. L. Hinson from Seattle to Albany, where he is wanted on a charge of automobile theft.

C. Van Patten & Son of Salem, have been awarded the contract to build a new dormitory at the state industrial school for girls. The plumbing and heating contract went to the Lebanon Plumbing & Heating company and the electrical fixtures will be installed by the Main Electric company of Portland. The entire cost is estimated at \$48,860.35.

At a session in Portland the state highway commission sold \$2,000,000 in state highway bonds at \$2,002,894. The issue was awarded to John E. Price & Co. and E. H. Rollins & Co.

J. H. Van Winkle, attorney general, recently gave down an opinion holding that when a vacancy is declared in the office of school director the remaining directors have authority to enter into contracts with teachers, also that the board after the election of new members has no

authority to invalidate the contract.

Sam A. Kocer, secretary of state, has advised J. L. Finney, secretary of the Columbia River Fishermen's league that 1464 signatures of the qualified voters of the Twentieth Judicial district are necessary on petitions before recall proceedings can be instituted against Circuit Judge J. A. Eakins.

Oregon is now first among all the states in the ninth corps area of the United States army in the strength and efficiency of its national guard and second in the entire nation, according to information received from the war department by Adjutant General George A. White. Washington is second in the ninth corps area, but is nine points behind Oregon, and California is third, but 46 points behind Oregon. In the nation only Pennsylvania is ahead of this state.

Governor Olcott, Secretary of State Kozar, Warden L. H. Compton of the state penitentiary and Lyman G. Rice, members of the bonus and loan commission, climbed Mount Hood Sunday. The excursion was under the direction of the American Legion post at Hood River.

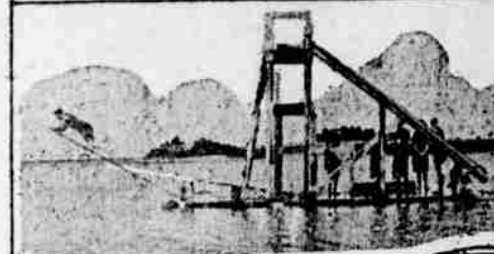

The temperature of this popular resort on Passamaquoddy Bay in New Brunswick, has averaged 70 degrees F. On July first the mercury stood at 62. This fact has drawn many visitors to St. Andrew's and the hotels are thronged with a gay crowd which added to the Canadian smart set whose palatial cottages overlook the Bay, makes the northern Newport a lively place.
