MAN IDENTIFIED AS BRUMFIELD HOLDS UP MAZAMAS

PORTLAND HIKING PARTY AND SUPPLY TRUCK ROBBED NEAR DIAMOND LAKE FRIDAY

Water Bags Taken From Automobile and Supplies Procured
From Truck—Deputy Sheriff Hopkins Within Few Miles
of Robbers—Holdup Men Cut Telephone Lines.

SUSPECT IS SEEN.
(By United Press.)
LAPINE, Aug. 6.—Two highwaymen, one of whom is believed to be Dr. R. M. Brumfield, wanted in Roseburg for the murder of Dennis Russell, fled through Lapine early this morning heading north. They drove a roadster car. The Mazamas, robbed by the men, claimed that the larger of the two closely resembled the pictures of Brumfield. Officers are following the men and other officers are coming south from Bend in an effort to apprehend the fugitives.

WITNESSES SEE CRIME.

LAPINE, Aug. 6.—A man answering the description of Dr. Brumfield, was seen holding up two Mazamas 20 miles south of Crescent on the Klamath road. Several eye witnesses saw the crime committed. The victims of the holdup identified Brumfield's photograph as that of the robber. The same men held up another party and took provisions. Poses are in pursuit from here.

NO FURTHER NEWS.

BEND, Aug. 6.—(2:30 p. m.)—Nothing further has been heard from the sheriff's posse pursuing the two highwaymen near Lapine.

A man identified from a picture as Dr. R. M. Brumfield and a shorter man answering the description of the man seen with the fugitive at Crescent, late yesterday afternoon held up a car containing a party of Mazamas, from Portland, taking \$80 in money and the water bags from the car, escaping into Beaver marsh, near Diamond Lake, on the Diamond Lake road. A short time later these same two men held up and robbed a truck carrying supplies for the hiking party and appropriated a large amount of groceries and other supplies. "High Jackers" Rob Harvest Hands

KANSAS CITY, Aug. 6.—Bandits termed "high jackers" who make a business of riding freight trains in the wheat belt of Kansas and Oklahoma, robbing the harvest hands, are becoming bolder and are receiving the attention of the local authorities. Wednesday night two robbers attempted to hold up a party of former soldiers and harvest hands on a freight train. The soldiers began shooting. One "high jacker" was killed and four harvesters were wounded. The other robber escaped.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 6.—Heavily armed posses are sweeping through the big basin country, in the lonely giant redwood forest, seeking Father Patrick Heslin, whom a kidnapper is holding for ransom at peril of his life. A speeding automobile was seen last night containing four men, one of whom was believed to be the priest.

Germans Land Illegally In U. S.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6.—Large numbers of Germans are shipping at German ports as seamen at wages of one cent a month. Chairman Lasker of the shipping board advised Secretary of Labor Davis. The belief was expressed that they land as seamen and then flee to the interior. Until the treaty of peace is signed it is illegal for Germans to land in the United States. Davis said he expected that a bill would be introduced requiring registration on arrival of all foreign seamen. He said that 40,000 Chinese were illegally here as a result of taking advantage of the seamen's act permitting foreign seamen to land in American ports.

List of Americans In Russia Wanted

RIGA, Aug. 6.—The American officials are preparing a full list of the American citizens in Russia, including prisoners, which will be turned over to Walter Lyman Brown, director of American relief. He is certain that at least one hundred Americans are seeking to leave Russia. The departure of Americans from Russia had not been reported up to late Friday.

Important Ruling Made by Commission

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6.—The interstate commerce commission denied that the railroad claims of the government should compensate the roads for the alleged loss in efficiency resulting from government control. The decision involves several hundred million dollars and determines what the railroads should get for "under maintenance" claims during the six months following the release from federal control. Although a comparatively small sum is involved these six months, the ruling will probably serve as a precedent for determining the claims accruing during the twenty-six months when the government operated the roads.

Roseburg to be Host on Friday

On Friday, August 12, Roseburg will be host to 50 or more prominent Portland business men and women, who are on a tour arranged by the Medford Chamber of Commerce and the Associated Industries of Oregon. These people, representing the leading publicity and commercial organizations of Portland are to meet at the Medford Chamber of Commerce at a big banquet and this morning notified the local Chamber of Commerce that Roseburg will be made an all night stop Friday. They will arrive late Friday evening and will be banqueted by the local Chamber and will leave Saturday morning. Judge J. W. Hamilton president of the local organization, today called a meeting for Monday evening, at which time plans will be made for the entertainment of the visitors.

Arrangements are already underway for the banquet and a program is hoped will be given also. The Douglas County Concert band will play for the occasion and other special features will be arranged.

Cholera Holds Russia In Grip

REVAL, Russia, Aug. 6.—A cholera death wave is sweeping the five new Russian districts and taking a heavy death toll, and twenty-four provinces are now affected. One hundred and fifty thousand victims are reported dead in two towns, fifty-two thousand of that number being children. Terror follows in the wake of the cholera and looters are following the trail of burning homes, which the occupants fired when they left. Armed bands are entering the homes and stealing food. Moscow is refusing to allow the fugitives to enter. It is reported that the state troops drove the throngs back with poison gases. The Russian leaders are attempting to arrange relief.

Aviators Will Stage Exhibition Here Tomorrow

Ivan R. Gates and "Jinx" Jenkins, of the Gates-Morris Aviation company of San Francisco, arrived here today and are making preparations for the big three days of aviation flights and stunting, starting Sunday. The plane, piloted by Captain Lowell Yerex, will arrive here this evening or early in the morning. Passenger flights will be made all day tomorrow and at 3 o'clock in the afternoon "Jinx" Jenkins, the intrepid aerial acrobat, will be taken aloft for his blood-chilling performance. Jenkins will loop the loop sitting on top of the wing and then with the machine diving and bobbing in the air he will walk over the wings and hang on to the gear by his legs.

Captain Yerex is perhaps one of the most famous war aviators doing exhibition work. The captain flew overseas with the Royal Air Force and has an enviable record on several of the French fronts. Captain Yerex was captured twice by the Germans and he has seven Hun planes to his credit. He was captured once in Carls Roue and again in Bavaria. In escaping from Carls Roue he crawled three days on his hands and knees without food or water and successfully made his way back to the allies' lines. At another time the captain led a squadron of 400 planes on a bombing expedition into Germany. Of the 400 ships only 148 returned. His appearance here tomorrow will be a big thing in the history of local aviation events.

MAY RAISE RATES.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6.—If the investigation of the parcel post rates shows a deficit of seventy million dollars in postal revenue, Postmaster General Hayes told the United Press that the parcel rates must be increased. Hayes said the business of the post office department had fallen off since April and that the parcel post should be self-supporting. A rigid system of economy is being instituted.

LEGION AERIAL SHOW.

The stunt flying exhibition to be staged at the Legion aviation field Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock by the Gates-Morris Aviation company, will be under the auspices of Umpqua Post of the American Legion. Spectators to the marvelous aerial demonstration will be tagged at the rate of fifty cents each and the Legion will apply their share of the proceeds to the development of the aviation field. Had it not been for Legion boys, Roseburg would not have had a landing field. As it is, this city boasts of one of the very best on the entire coast.

Three Principles Pacific Discussion

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6.—The United States government is basing the Pacific program discussion upon three cardinal principles, first, recognition, firm establishment of the open door in the Pacific, and Far East; second, protection, and maintenance of China's political and territorial integrity; and third, safeguarding Russia's integrity, principally involving Siberia.

Ulster Premier Prepares Conference

LONDON, Aug. 6.—De Valera's lieutenants are reported to be conferring with Premier Craig of Ulster and preparing a way for direct negotiations between the Sinn Fein and the Ulster leaders. This may effect the long discussed De Valera and Craig conference affecting the Ulster agreement to the Irish peace move. There is great fear of serious developments Monday when the government control over the Irish railways terminates, and the workers are facing wage reductions. De Valera appealed to the railroad labor, although it is known that opposition to a continuance of the present railway arrangement exists. There is fear of a break between De Valera and the wage workers.

Farmer Told To Hold Goods For High Prices

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6.—"Don't sell your goods until you get your price," was the warning members of the house and senate sent to the farmers all over the country as a result of the senate's approval of the administration's farm credits bill which is counted to boost the prices of all farm products. "Hold your cotton for twenty cents," was the word sent to the cotton states. The western senators told their constituents to ask higher prices and hold all of the surplus until the buyers meet the price asked. The senators predicted that this move would cause a much higher tone in the agricultural market.

Suspected Auto Thieves Arrested

Three men giving the names of Edward Beck, George Clark and Louis Gladden, were arrested last night suspected of having stolen an automobile. They appeared at the Ford garage yesterday evening and offered a very good Ford car for sale at a low price. The man on duty became suspicious and on an excuse that he was going to see a friend who might buy the car, summoned an officer. The men were placed in the city jail and are being held while an investigation is made.

Roseburgers Are Contented Lot

In yesterday's paper appeared an article from a London news sheet to the United Press giving a reporter's observations of one hundred representative home town faces.

Inspired by this article, a News-Review representative took occasion in his rounds to observe the faces of one hundred representative Roseburg people. His observations were as follows:

Thirty-eight out of the hundred appeared to be perfectly contented with themselves, their town, and the world in general. Twenty-one, on the other hand, looked as if they had lost their last friend or had fixed their mouth for a sweet pickle and bitter into a sour one by mistake.

Eleven out of the hundred had a far-away, dreamy look in their eyes; while twenty-six faces were as devoid of expression as stone images.

The remaining four were laughing or smiling broadly. This group included a bank clerk, a bill collector, the proprietor of a cleaning and pressing establishment, and a certain retiring county judge.

WHO INITIATED PENDING DISARMAMENT CONFERENCE LLOYD GEORGE OR HARDING?

British Public Concedes That Lloyd George Had a Good Share
In Promoting Events—United States Maintains Pres.
Harding Originated the Fine Idea.

LONDON, Aug. 6.—(U. P.)—Who initiated the pending Washington disarmament and Pacific Conference, President Harding or Lloyd George? This is a problem which is being very freely debated here, and one which is likely to prove a contentious subject for future historians.

The average member of the British public doesn't vastly care either way, but he readily concedes that Lloyd George, with characteristic "Welsh Wizardry" and acumen, has managed to get in first and rake off in advance a good share of any credit which may accrue to the promoters—without, however, incurring much blame if things fall through.

Disinterested officialdom say that the question can only be honestly answered by the select few who thoroughly understand the inner meaning of the little diplomatic juggle with the staid pages of "Hansard"—the British Parliamentary Official Record—a few weeks ago.

July 7 Lloyd George, rising in the House of Commons, to answer a harmless looking question about the Anglo-Japanese Treaty, said that he hoped to make a full statement on the following Monday (July 11), but that it would depend upon "replies received from the United States, Japan, and China." This was the version given by every reporter in the Press Gallery of the House of Commons. There were a few differences in the actual wording, some papers saying: "United States and Japan," others quoting only, "United States and China," while the majority included all three countries.

"Hansard's" report is never published until the following day, as the House of Commons does not rise until 11 p. m., and very often sits into the early hours of the morning. But mean while, energetic American correspondents had called this quotation to the United States, and equally energetic colleagues in Washington had been round to the State Department to find out about the presumed "Note" to which the British Premier was evidently expecting a reply.

Washington professed ignorance and said there was nothing to reply to, and within a few hours of Lloyd George's statement in the House of Commons, London editors and Parliamentary experts were worrying themselves thin over the mystery. They naturally went to the Foreign Office and No. 10 Downing street, and something had to be done.

The next day the Foreign Office spokesman blandly referred inquiries to the freshly printed sheets of "Hansard," which contained no reference to the Premier having mentioned replies from the United States, Japan or China. "Anybody quoting

Washington "came across," and if this was his object, it was at once very neatly. And as Washington was the only capital that really mattered the question of a conference was happily launched.

But did Lloyd George invite Harding, or did Harding invite Lloyd George?

School Boundary Board Creates New Districts at Melrose; Districts Consolidate

The school district boundary board consolidation and a hearing will be held on September 9.

At Days Creek there is a heated squabble over the union high school matter. A vote was held there recently and there was considerable opposition although the union school was favored and authorized. Some of those on the opposition side have now petitioned to dissolve the union district and as the petition is properly drawn up and signed it becomes necessary for the board to call an election in order that the patrons may vote on the question of dissolving the district. This election has been set for Monday, August 22, at 2 p. m.
