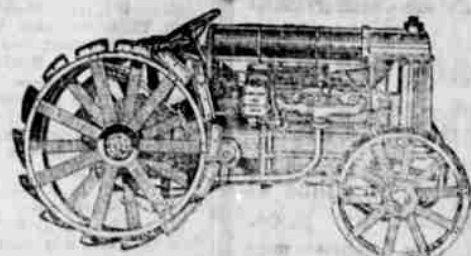

Club Coming

The Portland Ad Club party will leave for Crater Lake Friday morning, August 13, instead of at noon as originally scheduled, and will make the first night stop at Roseburg, leaving Roseburg Saturday morning and arrive at Medford Saturday night, leaving Sunday morning for Crater Lake, and spend Sunday afternoon and night there. Leave Medford Monday morning for Klamath Lake and Klamath Falls, spending the night at Klamath Falls.

Leave Klamath Falls Tuesday morning for Bend, and spend the night there, leave Bend Wednesday morning for The Dalles, spend the night at The Dalles, and leave Thursday morning for Portland, arriving the next day.

Full information on the road, together with a map will be furnished the driver of each car, and the party will be entertained by the local chambers of commerce at the various towns where stopovers are made. Dan C. Freeman, secretary of the Associated Industries of Oregon, is in charge of this special feature. The Ad Club committee, while Frank P. Tebbets is general chairman of the expedition.

The Chamber Motor Car sales company, through the courtesy of Mr. Harrington, district manager, will furnish the official pilot car. 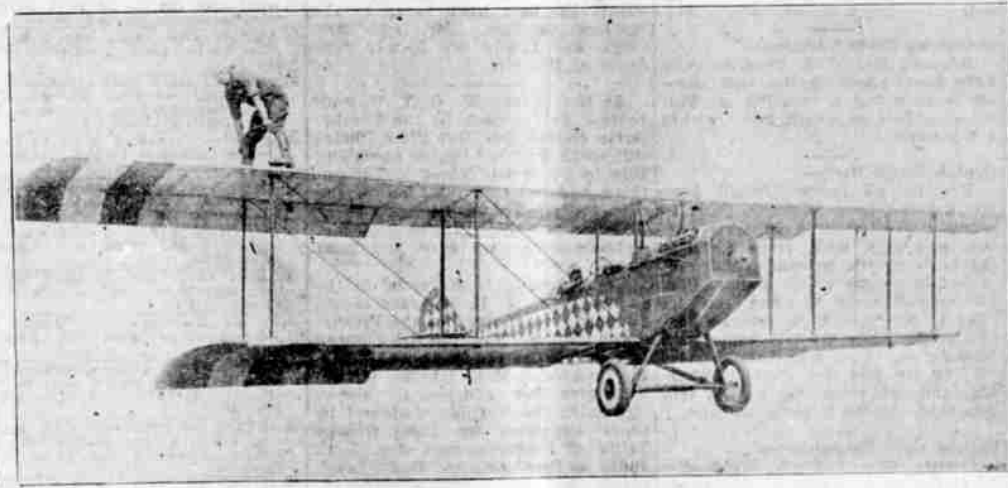

"Black Jack" Pershing may attend the Ninety-first reunion, to be held in Los Angeles September 24 and 25.
