Beads for insulation.
In certain installations, such as radio equipment, are lamp wiring and laboratory apparatus, it is often necessary to resort to beads for insulating bare wires. Heretofore, says the Scientific American, the beads have been of a plain design, with rounded ends, resulting in a rigid covering which prevented the covered wire from being bent as desired, or left bare sections of the wire between the beads because fewer beads had to be strung in order to allow for bending.

An English concern has recently introduced a new type of bead which is rounded at one end and hollowed out at the other, thus permitting of one bead fitting into the hollow of the next bead. These beads permit of covering a wire for its full length, yet do not interfere with the bending of said wire.

Bosch Has Big New Building In N. Y.

One of the finest buildings ever erected in New York by an automotive accessory manufacturer has just been completed by the American Bosch Magneto Corporation, of Springfield, Mass., according to Messrs Devaney & Burnett, who conduct the Official Bosch Service Station in this city. This building is located in the Columbus Circle district, which is now the center of automotive sales and manufacturing interests in New York.

The new Bosch Building, which stands at 17-19-21-23 West 60th Street, has ten stories and mezzanine and is thoroughly modern in every detail. It is of fire proof construction, being built of steel, stone and concrete throughout.

The American Bosch Magneto Corporation will occupy four complete floors, their quarters constituting perhaps the most elaborate automotive electrical sales and service station in the United States. A large service station and installation garage will be located in the basement and the sales and stock room, which will occupy the ground floor, will be spacious and especially well laid out, with high ceilings and large show windows. Part of the service equipment in this building is a truck elevator which is one of the largest and most powerful automobile lifts ever built.

The American Bosch Magneto Corporation will move into its new quarters the latter part of July, giving up its present building at 223-26 West 46th Street, where the Bosch Sign has "hung out" for more than a half score of years. The present quarters have long since proved inadequate, especially since the Bosch Company brought out its new Starting and Lighting System, its Battery Ignition System, and the Bosch Spark Plug, as well as taking over the sale of Gray & Davis Starting and Lighting Systems and automobile lamps.

It is the intention of the corporation to rent the upper floors of the building exclusively to automotive

concerns and retain an amount of motorom throughout the same structure.
