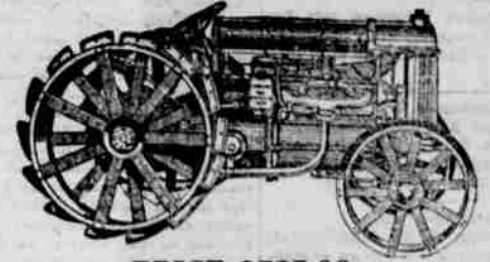

Resolutions Read.
The resolutions adopted at this year's convention were read by Miss Leona Genevieve Marsters. The text of the resolutions follows:

"We, the members of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union of Douglas County in convention assembled, recounting the victories for prohibition that are expressed in constitutional amendment, devotedly render to God, in whose name our banners are raised thanksgiving and praise.

"We recognize Him as the leader of our hosts, and Jesus Christ as the exponent of the principles which must be worked out in the customs of society and the laws of the land, if America is to lead the world out of this social, political and industrial unrest into the kingdom of peace and brotherhood. We declare ourselves anew to loyalty to Christ and to our unfinished task.

"Whereas we are surrounded by a social unrest and our community looks to the Christian people for leadership in ideals and in standards, and since the right to leadership of any community depends not upon its material advantages but upon the quality of its citizens, and as the integrity of the home, the wholesomeness of our social environment and the opportunity for normal development of the child life depends upon high standards of social morality and personal purity; Therefore, we declare for the single standard of morals for both men and women.

challenge to the loyalty of the citizenship of our country. We pledge ourselves to a campaign of education as to the sacredness of law and our cooperation with officials elected to enforce the law.

"Resolved, that because of the tremendous influence of motion pictures, we favor a state censorship law that will prevent the exhibition of objectionable films.

"Resolved, that we deplore the increased use of tobacco and favor strict enforcement of all laws pertaining to the use and sale in any form—especially do we deplore the use of cigarettes by boys.

"Resolved, that alcohol is a poison, we emphasize anew the necessity for teaching of scientific temperance in our schools.

"With sincerity we express our thanks to Mrs. Hadley for the artistic and beautiful decorations; to the local committees for their courtesies and generous hospitality; to the pastor and people of this church who especially express thanks for the use of this church. We wish to express appreciation of the kindness of the News-Review editor in sending a reporter to this convention, and for the generous space given reports of this convention. MOVED PARISIANS TO FRENZY

Proposal to Slightly Increase Prevailing Height of Buildings Denounced as Idea of Vandal.

An outburst of indignation greeted the recent proposal of M. Frantz-Jourdain, which, to relieve the housing shortage in Paris, would authorize the owners of buildings on avenues having a minimum of 20 meters to add another floor. This would mean that the Paris population would at once and at comparatively low cost obtain fifteen thousand new places of abode—a safe estimate, with a reduction of 70 per cent in cost, since the existing roofs and supporting construction could still be used, and the purchase of building lots, costs of excavating foundations, etc., demanded by the most unpretentious of new houses, would be avoided, remarks L'Illustration, Paris, (translated for the Kansas City Star).

Fifteen thousand dwelling places! The recent census showed us that an increase of 3,000 would relieve the present shortage. And the suggested violation of the rule governing our public ways could be confined to only a few exterior boulevards. Surely the beauty of Paris would not be jeopardized by such a provision.

M. Frantz-Jourdain, however, barely had time to finish his explanation. Newspaper editors, suddenly inspired with the most overwhelming esthetic rage, denounced him as a traitor. Articles flaying the barbarian in our midst imposed silence upon him. Hands off the sacred roof lines of the Boulevard Berthier or the Boulevard Gouvion-Saint-Cyr. The surplus of 16,000 Parisians can wait. And most of the readers of these articles breathe a sigh of relief as though the capital, threatened by vandals, had narrowly escaped a terrible danger.
