HEADING OFF POOR DEVELOPMENT.

An unsatisfactory development of a city or town is the result of a failure to look ahead and to plan the way in which a town shall grow. It often happens that there will be some lot of land in a growing town that is not well suited to building. It may be low and marshy, or may be too steep or rough. The owners may sell it cheap on account of these conditions, and the land fall into the hands of some one who will put up mean and ugly buildings on it, thus injuring a whole neighborhood. In some places steep hillsides and bluffs have developed in this way. They were not desirable for construction purposes, so that they sold for little money, and soon were covered over with ugly rookeries. People would not settle down and buy such homes, so they were tenanted by people who would not keep them up or take the least pains to beautify them. If such land was so wholly unsuited for building, it would have been better for the city to have bought it when it could have been had for almost nothing, then to have planted it to trees. In time it would have developed into a beautiful park, and the roughness of the ground would have made it more lovely. Property all around would have increased in value instead of decreasing. In many places tracts that seemed too rough for building, have been so handled by tasteful landscape architects that they have grown into beautiful neighborhoods. The streets were laid out so as to fit the land, and make every house lot suitable for a dwelling. The roughest places were planted to trees so as to make beauty spots. Cities should take more control over land development and prevent excrescences from growing up, and encourage tasteful handling of new tracts.

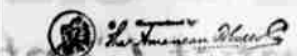

Easily Sunk.
Another example of German efficiency goes by the board in the description, in the Scientific American, of the use of the latest German battleship. Baden, a superdreadnaught, as a target in an attack by gunfire from 15-inch guns and torpedoes.

The Baden was one of the battleships turned over to the allies at the time of the armistice to be destroyed. She sank after a comparatively brief bombardment, the 13-inch belt being readily perforated at a 10,000-yard range. This, says the Scientific American, seems to dispose of the rather widely accepted belief that the German capital ships were possessed of defensive qualities which exceeded those of similar ships in navies of the world.

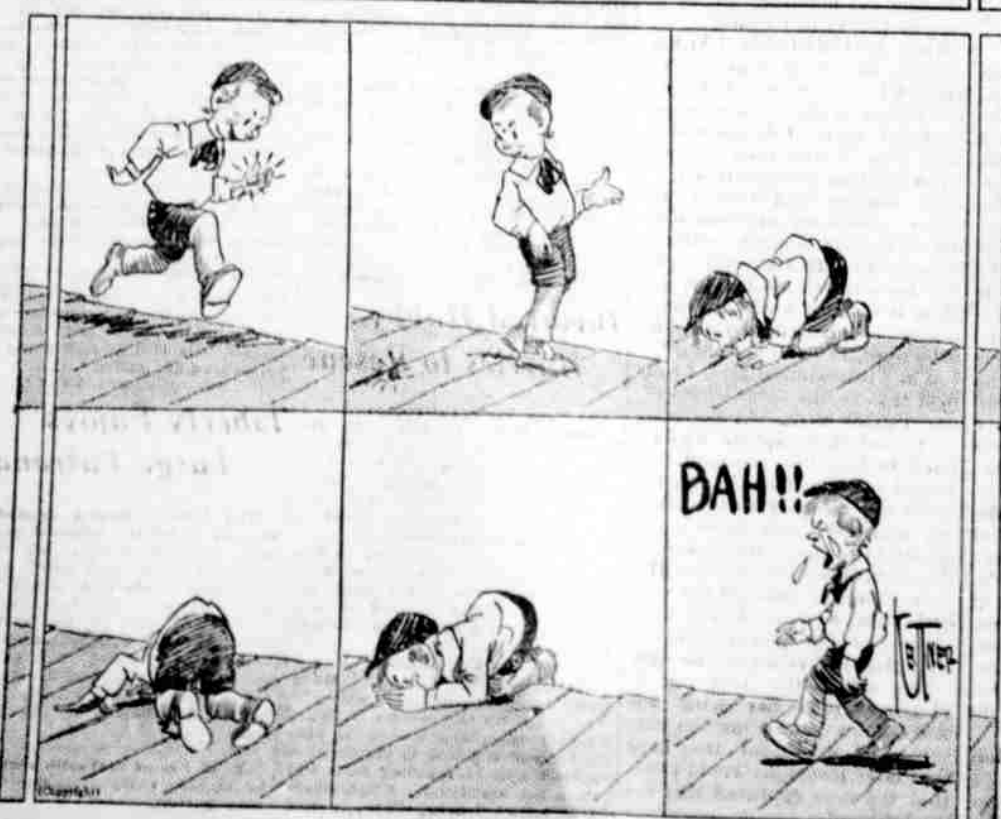
