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STATE FAIR TO BE BEST IN HISTORY

Anticipated That Industrial Club Showing Will Be A Big Point of Interest

PRIZES ARE VALUABLE

Over Seventy-five Thousand Dollars to Winners in Various Entries in Exhibits and Races—Fast Horses Entered.

SALEM, Or., Aug. 20.—(Special.)—This year, which marks the 60th anniversary of the Oregon state fair, is expected to also witness the greatest annual event in the state's history. Everything points conclusively to this from the increased number of entries made this early in the season to the enlargement and erection of new buildings. Practically every foot of ground space has already been contracted for, with the out-door walks and roads have been added and in the event of rain during any days of the fair, attendants may practically traverse the entire exhibit under cover.

Among the new buildings are two large machine halls 24 by 180 feet, which are prepared to house thirty to forty exhibits; new poultry building 80 by 140 feet, which will care for from 25,000 to 400 birds, and the new rest room erected by the G. A. R. All these new structures conform in line and arrangement to the latest ideas in architecture, and will in each instance fill a long-felt want.

The old poultry building has been remodeled and will care for the overflow of sheep entries. The grandstand, as well as several other buildings has been reshingled and remodeled, the stadium changed to house the boys and girls who attend the state fair along with the industrial exhibits, and various other alterations made about the grounds. It is anticipated that the showing made by the boys and girls of the state will be especially large and interesting this year, with several additional counties adding their names to the list of those competing for the splendid prizes offered.

Seventy-five thousand dollars has been offered altogether in premiums and purses. The premium lists have been revised to meet the growing need. Purses range up to \$2,000, with the large purses offered on Salem and Portland days, which fall on Wednesday and Thursday of the week of state fair, which is from September 26 to October 1.

A number of fast horses have been in Salem for several months past, being worked out on the local track. The list of entries disclose the names of many of the best horses of the northwest, as well as those of some of the larger California and Canadian stables. The track is in excellent condition and horsemen predict that racing history will be made on "Lone Oak" track.

Being an anniversary year, secretary A. H. Lea and other members of the state fair board are anticipating a record attendance, numbering a large percentage of pioneers, who plan to retrace on the famous old camp ground adjoining the state fair ground proper.

The all-American feature originated last year, will again be noted this year, but instead of setting aside one day for foreign born citizens as was the initial order, an exhibit of arts and crafts of other countries will be made during the entire week, under the jurisdiction of people from the country represented. The all-American plans are under the superintendency of Mrs. Isaac Lee Patterson of Salem, vice-president general of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.
