FARM REMINDERS.

The tents of fall web worms may be cut out or burned during the day as soon as found. Where infestation is general a lead arsenate spray, 4-100, may be used. The injury is similar to that of tent caterpillars, but the tent is larger and more like gauze. A quick flame of insufficient duration to injure the tree will kill the worms found feeding under the tent.—O. A. C. Experiment Station.

Sunflowers that were grown on dry land need water when put in the silo. If they are green, immature, and full of water as they were in the fall of 1920, it is better to let them wilt before putting them in the silo.—O. A. C. Experiment Station.

Fall wheat, oats and barley should be cleaned free of weed seed, treated with formaldehyde and planted late in September or early in October in the Willamette valley. Recommended rates of seeding on good land are: wheat 1 1/2 to 2 bushels. For oats and vetch 40 pounds of oats with 60 to 80 pounds of vetch have been found satisfactory.—O. A. C. Experiment Station.

The following varieties of wheat are recommended by the O. A. C. Experiment station because they have been found to yield well: Western Oregon: white winter, Rink, Folse, or red chaff, and Kline less highly; Eastern Oregon dry lands: Turkey red and hybrid 128; Eastern Oregon irrigated lands: Hybrid 128, forty fold, and on some rich soils where winter conditions are very severe, turkey red. These lots contain no seven-headed, wild goose, mummy, miracle, or wonder or super wheats, as these have failed in actual trial to yield well in Oregon.

May Irrigate Azalea Farms

There is a possibility that at least a part of the Azalea river (Cow creek) valley will be irrigated in the near future, says the Riddle Enterprise.

George Neuner, Jr., who owns the old King place about three miles out, was in the city Sunday from Roseburg and informed some of his friends here that he had filed on the water right for irrigation purposes and that if he could not interest his neighbors in a cooperative irrigation project that he would at least arrange to water his own farm before another growing season.

Mr. Neuner states that while he is a firm believer in the great advantage irrigation will be to the valley, he does not favor the building of a plant by outside capital which would place the farmers under the ditch at the mercy of capitalists for years to come, but he does favor the building of a system by the ranchers themselves and believes that the project will be an unqualified success if promoted by the water users.

There is not a doubt in the world that irrigation will make six blades of grass where there was but one growing before and every forty-acre place which is now supporting one family will support five families when properly watered.

It is an easy matter for anyone who has ever lived in an irrigated country and seen what water will do for the crops to visualize a family on every ten acre tract in this valley, all making more with less effort than one-fifth of the population can now make on the land.

A number of the neighbors of Mr. Neuner are interested and it is quite likely that an irrigation project will be launched in the very near future, which will mean more for the prosperity of this valley than all the new business enterprises that could possibly be established.

Green Prunes Are Marketed

McKay brothers are now receiving green prunes at the new warehouse and packing plant at Sutherlin. A considerable number of growers have signed up their crops and are busy marketing them direct from the orchards, says the Oakland Tribune.

The new warehouse, which is a two-story frame structure, is the most capacious and substantial of its kind in this section. It is 50 by 100 feet with storage room on first floor for several carloads of apples and a

commodious sorting and packing room on the second. The construction work, which has been done in charge of J. C. Saucerman, was practically completed the first of the week but some finishing and painting remain to be done.

A railroad siding has been laid alongside the plant so that refrigerator cars can be held in readiness for the immediate shipment of prunes as soon as they can be graded and boxed. McKay Bros. state that with the system they are using the prunes are loaded in the cars within four hours from the time they leave the orchard. This rapid handling is necessary to prevent deterioration of green fruit.

The prunes are being delivered at the door of the packing house in ing boxes and are immediately graded and boxed. The boxes are placed in the cars as soon as filled. The plant has a capacity of 28,000 boxes or two carloads a day.

Butter Soars 3 Cents Higher

PORTLAND, Aug. 22.—(U.P.)—Butter on the Portland market today soared three cents higher than it was last week, when dealers admitted the price at that time was unreasonable. The increase of the price here galloped up the ladder following on the heels of the Seattle market, the idea being that should Portland not follow suit all butter-fat producers would ship their output to the Puget Sound point.

At the same time with this news comes the announcement that an Oregon cow, has gone and broken the world's record for butterfat production, making a mark of 827.47 pounds, and 11,729 for milk, in pounds, of course. Dairy testers have reported exceptionally heavy production for dairy cattle for this time of year.

However, the explanation is that creamery men are preparing to get in their winter's storage—so maybe it's just as well St. Mawes' Lad's Lady and her sisters put on extra steam.

NOTICE OF INTENTION TO IMPROVE FOWLER STREET.

Notice is hereby given that at a meeting of the Common Council of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, held on the 14th day of July, 1921, the following resolution was adopted:

"Resolved, that the Common Council of the City of Roseburg deems it expedient and necessary and hereby proposes to improve Fowler Street from the north line of Court Street to the north line of Lot 11, Block 1, Cradwick Addition to said city, in the City of Roseburg, Oregon, in the following manner:

First: By grading the street to the proper sub-grade.
Second: By paving the roadway of said street twenty-four feet wide with concrete pavement.
Third: By constructing concrete curbs.
Fourth: By constructing sub-drains if necessary.
Fifth: By constructing street monuments, if necessary.
Sixth: By laying vitrified sewer pipe.
Seventh: By constructing catch-basins and inlets.

Said improvements are to be made in accordance with the Charter and Ordinances of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, and the grade, plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer, filed in the office of the City Recorder on the 14th day of July, 1921, which said grade plans, specifications and estimates are hereby approved and adopted.

The entire cost of said improvement, including the cost of engineering, advertising, abstracting, clerical help and interest, shall be assessed upon the property especially benefited thereby, as provided by the Charter of the City of Roseburg, and in accordance with the petition of the property owners to be benefited by said improvement, and no part thereof shall be paid by the City of Roseburg.

The estimate of the City Engineer of the probable detailed cost of said improvement is the sum of \$2453.39. Resolved, that the City Recorder of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, be and he is hereby directed to give notice of said proposed improvement as provided by the Charter of the City of Roseburg.
