Brumfield In Rage When Questioned On Murder Case

quiet disposition to use of a terrible temper.

Dr. A. F. Sether and Attorney Rice appeared at the jail to make an examination of the prisoner's physical condition. Some spoiled meat which the prisoner had eaten yesterday had upset his stomach, and Brumfield's attorney had summoned the doctor. It was found that the man was feeling better today and not suffering from the effects of the food he had consumed. Dr. Sether made an inspection of the quarters on the upper and lower floors of the jail. In an interview this afternoon he stated that there was absolutely no choice of quarters, that is, the cells on the upper floor were not one bit better than those on the lower floor.

A. N. Orritt, one of Brumfield's attorneys, in a statement today said that his interview with the prisoner today were along financial lines. Brumfield is anxious to convert his holdings into cash in order to satisfy his creditors. Until this is done, Attorney Orritt said, the man would not talk concerning the case.

Dr. Brumfield appears to be just as much at home in the cell of the jail as he did in his dental office in the Perkins building. He is dressed very neatly, works in the same erect manner, and is courteous to those about him. The only persons he has taken a violent dislike to are newspaper reporters, and when they are around him he is very irritable and nervous.

When questioned further today, Brumfield still refused to discuss the murder.

The following direct question was asked of him: You claim to have had a lapse of memory since the Sunday preceding the crime. Can you explain why it is you appeared perfectly normal in your dental office on the day of July 15th, the day of the murder?

He smiled and shook his head. "No," as if to say, "It's none of your business."

When Sheriff Starmer reappeared in Brumfield's cell following the departure of the News-Review representative, Brumfield was in a fighting rage. He told the sheriff in heated tones of the interview, and said:

"I'll never talk to that man again as long as I live. No, I'll not talk to him on any subject. I don't want to see him, he makes me mad."

Two suitcases, the property of Dr. M. Brumfield, arrived here by express today from Calgary, Canada. The suitcases contained the personal effects, clothing, etc., of the captured man and were expressed to this city by the Roseburg officers who brought Brumfield back to this city.

One of the suitcases, a black one, is thought to have been taken by Brumfield, who he left this city following the murder, but the other one, a brown one, was probably purchased in some northern city.

Douglas Pioneer Died Sunday

William Gillaspie Burney Dixon, who passed away at Roseburg, Ore., August 21, 1934, was born near Canton in Fulton county, Illinois, August 22, 1884, and had he lived one more day would have been 50 years of age.

He was the son of Hiram and Elizabeth Dixon, early pioneer residents of Douglas county, and crossed the plains to Oregon by ox team in the year 1852, and is one of the last of the few remaining pioneers who migrated into Oregon when the country was new.

His father, Hiram Dixon, first settled in Marion county, where he resided for about a year, when he moved to Douglas county, where he purchased a large ranch about two miles north of Roseburg, and became one of the largest land owners in Douglas county.

In later years Burney Dixon, by inheritance, became the owner of the original farm home formerly owned by his father, and by thrift and prosperity he erected thereon a fine home, and by careful cultivation of the soil made it one of the beauty spots of Douglas county, and one of the finest homes to be found in Oregon in those days.

He was married to Cynthia Jane Bradley October 12, 1878, who died December 26, 1893, and two children were born to their union, they being Mrs. S. B. Crouch of Roseburg, and Volney Dixon of Medford, both of whom survive him, and he also leaves surviving him Mrs. G. W. Jones, a sister of Roseburg, and James Harvey Dixon, a brother of Eugene, besides four grandchildren.

During the later years of his life Mr. Dixon made his home in and about Roseburg, where he has a host of friends.

For many years he has been a devout member of the Baptist church of Roseburg.

He was a man of strict honesty and integrity, and of exemplary habits, and this fact together with his sunny disposition, endeared him to all who knew him, and in his passing this community has lost one of its best and most upright and respected citizens, who always had the community welfare at heart.

The funeral will be held at the Roseburg Undertaking parlors on Tuesday, August 22, at 10 a. m., with burial at the Jones' cemetery west of Edenhower.
