PENDLETON, Or., Aug. 23.—(U. P.)—Now forest rangers in the Umatilla forest service are going to have their chance to howl.

The howlers—Tis nothing but a sort of telephone, Freddy—will be installed at Corporation station two miles above Blugham at the Ukiah station and at the Tucannon station in the Dayton region, according to R. A. Botcher, assistant forest supervisor. The first named station will be equipped at once.

The howler innovation consists of a switchboard located at the stations and hand sets used by field men to communicate with the stations. The hand sets are light and easily carried and may be connected anywhere along the line when it becomes necessary for a field man to talk to headquarters. The howler gets its name from the noise it makes when the field man is "ringing" head quarters.

Several Oregon forests now have the devices, it is said.
