PUBLIC SCHOOLS AS HEALTH MEDIUM.

As suggesting strongly that the public health of the community can be improved through the medium of the public school much more successfully possibly than through other agencies, thus emphasizing the fact that better welfare work should be subordinated to education, attention is being directed to the achievements of Arlington county, Virginia, along this line. When a health campaign was inaugurated the suggestion was made that it could be made both effective and popular only with the assistance of the school children and the public schools.

This suggestion was adopted, with the result that the children not only are improving their own health but they are setting an example for good to their elders. Contests were started between the boys and girls, and between different classes, and today the greatest enthusiasm is shown by members of one group of contestants, who are able to show greater cleanliness of face, hands, nails, teeth, and head, sleeping with the windows open, keeping desks and adjacent floors clean, standing, sitting, and marching properly, etc.

Whether this enthusiasm grows out of the physical results attained or the fact the winners will receive a prize is a question, but regardless of this, the good results physically are a reality. It is the impression of those who have studied the health campaign that only through the medium of the schools and the interest of the school children could desirable results have been attained. What has been possible in the community in question and, possibly, in other communities, friends of the measure say, points a moral as to the proper relation of health and other welfare work to that of education.

Mayor Hamilton Accepts Invitation

Hon. W. S. Hamilton, mayor of Roseburg, has accepted the invitation of the National Budget committee to serve as honorary chairman of the local committee of that organization which is engaged in a nationwide effort to gain popular support of the efforts of Gen. Charles G. Dawes, director of the budget, to effect a reduction of the burden of federal taxes.

Announcement of the acceptance of the mayor was made yesterday by Stanley H. Howe, director of the National Budget committee, whose headquarters are at 7 West Eighth street, New York City. The mayor will join with the chief magistrates of a thousand cities throughout the country in fostering the spirit of popular approval of the policy of federal retrenchment.

Active heads of local committees are being selected daily from among the most prominent business and professional men in their respective communities, and efforts are under way to secure the cooperation of leading citizens in a thousand cities by the formation of a nation-wide "Budget Guard" whose members will simply pledge their support to the establishment of a business-like administration of governmental appropriations and expenditures.

Every member of the National Budget committee, which was instrumental in initiating and passing the National Budget bill, is asked to urge upon his fellow citizens the necessity for solidly supporting the present program of governmental efficiency and economy by the elimination of every possible item of expenditure. Every taxpayer who favors a reduction of the present unbearable tax burden is invited to join with their fellow townsmen in helping to crystallize public opinion and defeat unnecessary additions to federal expense.

Mayors of Dallas, Pendleton, Salem and Bend have also become honorary members of the organization.
