DISAPPEARING BATTLE SCARS.

Nature blushes for the deeds of men; the good green earth forgets but does not forget. An English writer lately returned from a tour of that part of France occupied during the war by the British forces writes: "Four-fifths of the vast provinces charred and mutilated by war between Amiens and Avesnes is under cultivation. Odd stretches of fighting ground in Flanders, the labyrinth south of Vimy ridge, the wider tracts astride Ancre and Scarpe, may still be found just as the last great struggle left them; but it would take a greater than Hindenburg to trace across the ground the entire Hindenburg line, the elaborate emplacements of which have been broken up for the maintenance of roads." Let the work of healing the wounded battle grounds be hastened. It is one of the fortunate provisions of the treaty that insofar as possible restoration is to be made. When peaceful homes and flourishing fields replace the devastated areas of France and Belgium the world will more easily forget its period of frenzy; the coming generation will have less to prompt the nurture of its hatreds. But the earth will treasure its bitter memories. On nearly the same ground in the studious period of peace following the Franco-Prussian war, scholars excavated the sites of Caesar's camps and battlefields in Gaul. More than 1800 years had elapsed, but Caesar's trenches and the famous "lilies" designed as man-traps were still easily recognizable by the displaced strata of soils and the mixture of dark humus with the excavated chalk beds. And in those hidden pits were the bones of men, their broken swords and spears and battered armor. Beneath the poppies of Flanders field will lie the records of the world's supreme outburst of madness. Let the grasses and flowers grow quickly and conceal them, for just now the world has need of soothing forgetfulness. But let them remain also forever to be studied by archaeologists and historians and to be meditated upon by philosophers, in the hope that the wisdom of mankind may avail to prevent the recurrence of such a catastrophe.

"Every advance of civilization increases the proportion of criminals and weaklings—all directly traceable to improper care of the eyes. "Ninety per cent of the industrial accidents, as well as motorcar and train wrecks, are due to poor eyes."

"Eighty per cent of the educated people of the United States have curvature of the spine, with its accompanying ills, due to improper care during the physical formation periods."

Neglect of the eyes in youth is responsible for more than half the inmates of our penal institutions."

"A large percentage of those now in asylums would never have been there had their eyes been properly cared for in youth."

"Eye strain brings on poor health, nervousness, insomnia and other conditions which result in insanity."

"With our increasing idea of specialization in occupations, our mechanical devices we are rapidly building up a condition of strain, which can only result in more criminals and insane unless we adopt some method of overcoming this tremendous strain which the eyes were never fitted to stand."

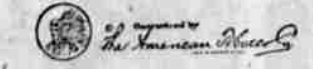

Road work in all parts of Douglas county is progressing rapidly, according to a statement made today by County Judge Quine. Judge Quine yesterday made a trip to the Cleveland section where he inspected some road work under construction. The contract for the Cleveland work was accepted by W. R. Vinson, and he has a large crew of men employed at the present time. Mr. Vinson is grading and graveling the road and when the work is completed it will be one of the finest pieces of highway in the county. Large cement culverts are being placed and a fine grade being established. Judge Quine states that another fine piece of road, under construction between Drain and Elkton, the Hancock mountain road. The passage of the road bonds made possible the extensive highway work in this county.
