State Fair Program Is Comprehensive

SALEM, Or., Aug. 29.—(Special.)—The entertainment program to be furnished state fair patrons this year will be much more comprehensive and elaborate than heretofore, according to officials, and will include everything from new and novel stunts along the midway to special auto speed events for the first three days of the fair.

The largest crowds in years is predicted, and it is for this reason that particular stress is to be laid upon the program of amusement. Concessions and those seeking special privileges are in excess of any heretofore recorded, and those who know, state that this is always a certain sign of a big attendance, these people through years of experience sensing the popular inclination.

Aside from the horse racing, automobile races will be among the stellar attractions. J. R. Lyle of Salem, a member of the state fair board, has charge of this special feature. He announces that fifteen hundred dollars in prizes will be distributed, with the list of entrants open to both professional and non-professional drivers. Specially constructed cars, driven by the fastest men in the Pacific northwest, will compete, with the result that state fair audiences should be furnished thrills a-plenty during the first part of the week.

The night horse show, as during previous years, will again come in for general notice. Names are daily being added to the list of those who will take part, and these include the splendid McCleave string from Vancouver, B. C., which carried off honors at last year's horse show in Salem and later at the Pacific Livestock Exposition in Portland.

Showing for the first time on the western circuit will be the San Francisco Exposition Carnival company, one of the largest amusement concerns, which will bring to the Oregon state fair a new and novel line of attractions, and which will be established along the midway. Another large amusement company will also furnish entertainment for old and young, and in the evening there will be special programs of unusual merit in the new pavilion.

Band concerts will be daily attractions, with H. N. Stoudenmeyer's organization, of Portland, and smaller ones from various parts of the state contributing. Band music will also be in order each afternoon at the races.

The capital city is planning to extend the glad hand to all visitors, during the state fair week, and is already formulating plans whereby no detail will be overlooked to insure the comfort and enjoyment of out-of-town folk. The commercial club, co-operating with individuals is to list the names of all homes where board or rooms may be secured, and it is expected that a much more systematic scheme may be worked out than heretofore, thus relieving strangers of all worry and inconvenience.

Tuesday of the week, September 26-October 1, has been set aside as Boosters' Day, with the Salem Cherrians acting as official hosts. An invitation will be issued to all civic organizations of the state to attend the state fair that day, and for their pleasure a special program is being worked out. All organizations in uniform will be asked to appear in their regulation garb, and marches, booster yells and songs will be in order throughout the day. All visiting women will be met and entertained by wives and feminine members of Cherrian households.

Police regulation of the fair grounds will be strict, giving those who camp or send exhibits, the assurance that everything and everybody will be adequately looked after. Boy Scouts of the Salem chapter, in accordance with an annual custom, will again establish headquarters on the grounds, where first aid may be secured in case of sickness or accident, and where lost and found articles may be reported, and general information accrued.

The various rest rooms about the grounds have been renovated, and a new one added. This is nearing completion, and will be known as the G. A. R. Memorial building.

The ground was donated by the state fair board, and the effort to establish funds for the structure was made by local post of the Women's Relief Corps. The building will replace the tent which has been in service during the past eight years. The type of architecture is bungalow, with many serviceable and attractive details featured.
