Oregon News Briefs of Interest

(News-Review Salem Bureau.)
SALEM, Or., Aug. 30.—(Special.)—H. H. Pomeroy and Gilbert Allen, two investigators of the state fire marshal's department, recently investigated some fires at Bend which were attended by suspicious circumstances.

Motor vehicle registration in Oregon for this year already has exceeded the registration for the entire twelve months of last year, according to figures from the office of Sam A. Koser, secretary of state. Registrations from January 1 to July 30 totaled 109,209.

The Powder River Land & Water company of Baker county has applied to the state desert land board for a five year extension on the contract between the state and the government and relative to that project. The project covers 45,000 acres.

The state emergency board, at a joint meeting with the World War veterans' bonus and aid commission agreed to provide whatever funds are necessary to administer the bonus and loan act up to \$50,000 in excess of the \$30,000 appropriated by the legislature. No additional money has yet been provided but it will be forthcoming whenever necessary.

Through the efforts of the United States forestry service, an old Oregon highway that has been closed for many years, has again been opened. It extends from Eugene across the summit of the Cascade mountains to Klamath Falls and greatly shortens the distance between those points.

The Scenic Preservation association of Oregon was temporarily organized at a meeting in the office of Governor Olcott Wednesday. The object will be to preserve the scenic beauties of the state, particularly along the highways, for the primary purpose of attracting tourists.

Paving of the Pacific highway south of Salem has been completed, making a hard surfaced road practically all the way to Salem to Jefferson.

United States treasury checks totaling more than \$24,000 have been received by Colonel George A. White, adjutant general of Oregon, for distribution among members of the Oregon national guard as army drill pay.

The people of Oregon are urged to join in the nation-wide celebration of Constitution day, September 17, in a letter issued by Governor Olcott.

In the action of the Beaver Portland Cement company against the Southern Pacific Railroad company, the public service commission has issued an order reducing from 40 to 22 cents a ton for the freight rate on rock from Zachar to Gold Hill.

The public service commission on Wednesday heard the case of the state against the Postal Telegraph company in which the former seeks to prevent the telegraph company from erecting a line of poles along the Lower Columbia River highway from Globe to Astoria.

Developments of a statewide plan of Americanization is the purpose of a committee that has been appointed by Governor Olcott. The members are W. B. Ayer, Judge Kanier and V. W. Tomlinson, Portland; Herman Wise, Astoria; Senator Ira S. Smith, Marshfield; J. S. Rorich, The Dalles; and Miss Margaret Cosper, Salem.

The history of Oregon will be studied in schools throughout the state this winter, according to Miss Cornelia Marvin, state librarian. Books are being shipped from the state library for that purpose.

C. E. Gates, mayor of Medford, has been appointed by Governor Olcott as a member of the state fair board. He succeeds E. V. Carter, of Medford, who has resigned.

Funds of the state accident commission totaling \$46,500 have been invested by the state bond commission in school district bonds. The investments are: School district No. 18, Jackson county, \$500; school district No. 31, Klamath county, \$12,000; school district No. 14, Lake county, \$9000; school district No. 10, Morrow county, \$20,000.

After a session of six weeks, held both in Salem and Portland, the telephone rate rehearing, conducted by the public service commission came to an end here Friday night. The city of Portland is given thirty days in which to file briefs with the commission, the telephone company is given twenty-five days more in which to answer and the city an additional ten days to reply.

A World war veterans' state bonus and loan commission on Friday announced for all counties except Multnomah the attorneys who will serve under the bonus act as examiners of abstracts on land mortgaged as security for loans. The Multnomah appointment is held up pending an opinion from the attorney general on the question whether the county can be divided into districts with an attorney for each district.

Of the 458 industrial accidents reported to the state accident commission for the week ending August 25, two were fatal. They were William Webster, Portland, laborer, and Mrs. Mattie Reed, of Wilbur, Or.
